Pastoral Relations Committee Gives Report

Members of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church met with the Hagersville United congregation on Sunday morning, August 25 at the 11 a.m. morning worship service. Minister Rev. Martin Rule chose as his sermon topic, "The Need to Decide." Organist Mrs. Isabelle Dorey accompanied soloist, Mrs. Donald Smith who sang "My Prayer For Today."

During the morning message, Rev. Rule said, "Man has many choices and opportunit-

ies in this day and age, with the most important thing being able to make the right decision. There must be no "ifs", "ands" or "buts", because in some circumstances, there will be no second choice. Just as Jesus said, "he who is not with me - is against me", and like it is today, there is just no way to have it both ways.

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen, headed by their Fire Chief, William McClarty, answered two calls on Thursday, August 22.

The first call was received at 3:15 p.m. when Ruby Brant called the Department because a grass fire was in progress along the road near her farm. This residence is situated on the Indian Line, corner of the 13th Concession, on the New Credit Indian Reservation. It was promptly extinguished by the firemen; there being no damage. Children were believed to be responsible for starting this mishap.

Children were also believed to be responsible for starting the second fire of the day. The alarm was placed at 8:43 p.m. by the local Regional Police. An unoccupied house, which was formerly owned by Harold Wren, now on property owned by Ontario Hydro was completely gutted.

Scene of this fire was on the 11th Concession of Walpole, directly to the rear of the large K & W farms on the Indian Line.

Shopping Plaza For West Of Jarvis Seeks Approval

A shopping plaza could be opened ten miles west of Jarvis in early 1975 if approval is given next month.

Norlynn Corporation is seeking the right to proceed with their Highway No. 3 project, which has been stalled for the last two years by red tape and annexation proceedings, from the Ontario Municipal Board.

The corporation's solicitor Bohdan Onyschuk had a letter placed on regional councillors desks Thursday morning explaining their position. The letter was mentioned but not introduced at the council meeting because of its late arrival.

Pay-back Proposal Rejected

A pay-back proposal of 20 cents on the dollar for money owing the Jarvis Water Department was rejected by Haldimand - Norfolk Regional Council Thursday.

The shareholders of Sandusky Construction Limited have offered to pay 20 cents on the dollar in connection with an outstanding account of \$70.40.

It's a matter of principal, Engineering Committee chairman Keith Richardson told The Record.

The company is consolidating its debts (not declaring bankruptcy) and can continue in business, he said.

In another matter concerning this Department, councillors agreed the Jarvis Water billing should be done by the Simcoe P.U.C. computer at a cost of 25 cents per bill.
