

H-N "Damns The Dam"

Haldimand - Norfolk regional councillors have jumped on the "Damn the Dam" bandwagon.

A Grand River Conservation Authority proposal to dam the Nith River and take 8,500 acres of farmland out of production got the "no" sign from the majority of regional councillors present in Cayuga last Thursday.

The "Damn the Dam" committee wrote a letter to council explaining they were a group of Blenheim Township citizens who opposed the flooding of 5,000 acres of "prime agricultural land" (8,500 would be involved in the total package) in order to supply the Waterloo Region with water. Since this is a project of the G.R.C.A., they continued, every member municipality which includes H-N would have to pay a share.

The Blenheim fight-

ers have apparently received support of local council, the Ontario Federation of Agriculture and other interested groups.

Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd recommended Haldimand - Norfolk not become involved in the issue.

"In the years to come we are going to be obliged to deal with the Waterloo Region," he said. And "I feel it would be better not to take sides in this issue."

Mr. Judd pointed out there was no indication in the letter on the affects of flood control.

"There must be some benefit there because the Nith is a tributary of the Grand," he said. Dunnville councillor Keith Richardson spoke against the dam saying 5,500 acres of good farmland should be preserved.

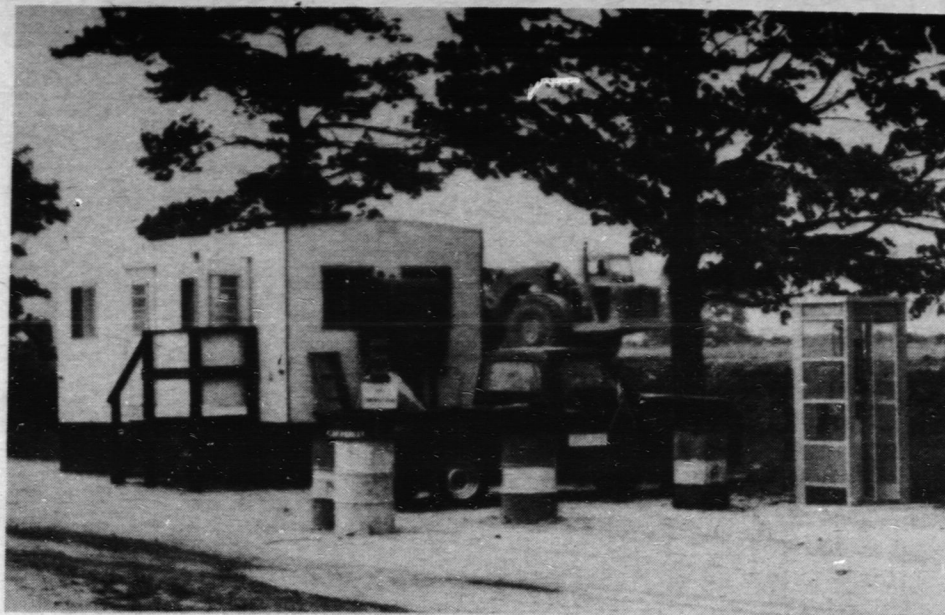
As for flood control, the GRCA showed how well they handle flood control this spring, he said.

"A dam is not good for flood control when full and no good for drinking water when empty." And obviously drinking water is more important, he said. "..... The sooner we damn the dam, the sooner we may get water in our own area," he added.

Delhi's Fred Peacock felt if something was being fostered on Haldimand - Norfolk against their wishes, councillors would appreciate support from other areas.

And H - N agreed to damn the dam.
