Budget Affect On Texaco

Texaco Canada Limited says the effect of the Federal budget introduced in the House of Commons on November 18, 1974, if approved, would be to increase the company's income tax for the

period subsequent to April 1974.

In the event that the budget proposals are enacted, and adopted by the provinces, the company estimates that provision for income taxes for Texaco Canada and subsidiary companies for the nine months ended September 30, 1974, would be increased retroactively by approx. \$6,800,000, re-

sulting in restated net income of \$36,503,000, equivalent to \$3.75 per common share.

On October 18 Texaco Canada announced estimated net earnings for the first nine months of 1974 of \$43,303,000, or \$4.45 a common share, compared to \$39,153,000, or \$4.02 per common share in the corresponding period of 1973.

H-N Arts Centre Opens Today

The long-awaited restoration of "Lynnwood", the new Centre for the Arts in the Haldimand-Norfolk region, is all but complete. Located in downtown Simcoe, the former Duncan Campbell house, dating back to 1851, will be open to the public beginning today, December 5.

Experts in architectural history, who have already viewed the interior, declare Lynnwood to be one of the finest houses in the province. It has a unique black walnut stair-rail, pine woodwork painted an elegant white, decorative plaster ceiling medallions and cornices

in its stately rooms, beautiful windows and doorways with ionic columns, and many fireplaces.

The Greek Revival portico framing the front doorway, with its antique transom and sidelights, has been completely rebuilt.

Work on other exterior features will have to wait until weather permits, but the interior will be ready for opening. Gilvesy Construction of Tillsonburg were the contractors. Furniture and carpeting have been provided through a generous grant from the Hellyer Foundation.

The opening exhibition of drawings by John Gould has been arranged by the Lynnwood Arts Centre under the Art Gallery of Ontario's special program, "Artists With Their Work". It will run until December 29.

The artist will present an evening of film on December 6, and will discuss his work with the public. John Gould has been called a "Renaissance-style draftsman who does beautifully-executed drawings in conte, gouache and ink". Fanshawe College has announced that it will purchase a Gould drawing and present it at the opening to Lynnwood, as a first acquisition for the permanent collection.

In January there will be an exhibition of Contemporary weaving and pottery.

Meanwhile children's classes are being conducted under the leadership of Barbara Barrett, Educational Co-ordinator. Ellen McIntosh, Lynnwood Arts Centre Curator, is in charge of all program and gallery arrangements.

The new Arts Centre will serve the entire Haldimand-Norfolk area with maximum community involvement in mind. A public program is under way aimed at promoting the understanding, appreciation and enjoyment of the arts. The Lynnwood Arts Centre is able to offer to the people of the region a program of exhibitions, lectures, musical events, children's art classes, leadership in crafts, in conjunction with participating community groups.

Hours during which Lynnwood will be open are being advertised in area newspapers and on radio: 10 to 5 daily Tues-

days to Fridays; 1 to 5 Saturdays and Sundays.

From December 5 to 13 the building will be open from 7:30 to 9:30 in the evening. Schools, service clubs and libraries are being informed of the arrangements. And there will be a Craft Shop in operation under the direction of Ruth Ann Logan.

The Simcoe Chamber of Commerce is co-operating with Lynnwood in making it possible for visitors to town, at the time of the Christmas lights tours, to go through the building. Otherwise arrangements may be made by appointment for group tours of Lynnwood.

The Board of Management of Lynnwood with Jim Tyrrell as Chairman, Catherine Smale as head of the Technical Committee, Carlos Ventin, Architect, are very proud of the results already achieved. Hundreds of local citizens have been involved in the project over the past year, and are eagerly looking forward to the day two weeks hence when the public will have the opportunity to view and to enjoy this beautiful regional centre for the arts.

Its era of usefulness is just beginning, and the hope is that for years to come, Lynnwood will not only be a delight to the eye, but will prove to be a tremendous vital asset to this whole area.

Harold Clapp, Dairy Specialist, proposes that to get the most benefit from feed testing, farmers need to translate the test results into effects on the production, reproduction and health of the herd. "If the results of chemical analysis are translated into action, they can eliminate most guesswork from dairy ration planning".

Feed Sample Kits and the follow-up assistance with ration planning are available at the local office of the Ministry of Agriculture and Food.
