

William Knowles Pays Tribute To James Brown

With the untimely passing of James E. Brown, former County Court Judge, Norfolk has lost an honoured citizen.

It is with deep sadness that we note this unhappy occurrence. I do wish, however, to take this opportunity of paying a very sincere tribute to my former colleague in the House of Commons.

Jim, as the Member for Brant was known in Ottawa, had a warm, engaging personality and infectious smile which won him friends on all sides of the House. He was a dedicated Parliamentarian who served his constituents well and faithfully.

On more than one instance Jim and I acted together to seek solutions to problems common to both our constituencies. Of him

it could be said that he fulfilled his duties as a man, a husband and father, and a Member of Parliament without blemish. His manner was unassuming but gracious and ever cheerful, despite his nagging handicap which plagued him in later years.

His sterling qualities of fair play and sympathetic understanding were characteristics which became him well when he assumed the office of County Court Judge for the County of Norfolk. It is indeed regrettable that failing health did not permit him to exercise his many attributes to the full and for a longer term.

(continued from page 1) without consideration for efficiency. He said he would rather identify one particular spot as the headquarters.

Lorna Miller of Dunnville pointed out that there had originally been a report saying the Cayuga building could handle it all and Chairman John McCombs acknowledged this. The split recommendation was apparently made to appease the east and west.

Mayor Judd rebutted, saying if they looked for space in Simcoe, they could find space in Simcoe. And, he felt councillors had to consider the "lack" in the Cayuga area of surveyors, engineers, lawyers, financial institutions, architects, etc. He said he has been asked by many people "how much longer are you going to compromise the Haldimand situation." Referring to the split, he said, it appears - the east is east, west is west and never the twain shall meet. He favored a field units system.

Gordon Miller of Walpole argued that with an organization and area as large as H - N, if the headquarters was set in one end, it wouldn't be hard to forget the people in the other end (e.g., Sherbrooke in Haldimand or Port Rowan in Norfolk). It may be dear. It may be worth it. Or it may not be all that expensive. "We don't really know," he said. Keith Richardson of the Town of Dunnville admitted he could see a definite advantage in

being in one building. But, to get all the people in H - N to accept regional government, he feels the split system would be much more acceptable.

Catherine Smale of Simcoe disagreed. She said the electorate is terrified of the cost of regional government. And not only is the split system expensive, it is also impossible to work with, she maintained. She feels the Chief Administrator Treasurer and Clerk needs a greater linkage than a telephone, as well as the Engineering and Planning Department.

Mrs. Smale, Mr. Judd, Clare Huffman of Delhi, Robert Causyn of the Township of Norfolk and Jerome Van De Slyke of the Township of Norfolk were the five who voted against the motion.

Mr. Huffman was in accord with the split decision, he said, until he heard about the communications set - up available. Reg Kempa, marketing representative for Bell Telephone, explained that there are some problems concerning communication because a preliminary check of cables between Cayuga and Simcoe shows there aren't any.

However, he said Bell is taking steps to get some in by April 1st. He explained two separate systems to council. Proposal 1 calls for one switchboard in Cayuga or Simcoe. All calls by ratepayers would go to this centre and be directed to the right person, whether he be in Cayuga or Simcoe, at no cost. System one

would cost approximately \$2,207 a month. Bell is presently working so they will have a couple cables connecting the two centres by April 1st, but Mr. Kempa said it could take one year to complete all the lines necessary.

With system two, there would be a switchboard in both Cayuga and Simcoe. Ratepayers in the Cayuga area, for example, would call there and have their calls put through to the correct department, whether it be in Cayuga or Simcoe, at no charge. This system would cost \$1,632 a month.

In terms of neatness, Mr. Kempa said, the one system is better. No decision on communication was made by council.

The Hagersville Flyers split the two games they played last week and as a result find themselves tied for second spot in the standings as the teams come down to the final week. Tuesday night the team travelled to Waterloo to take on the Tri - Cats and were clawed by the same to a tune of 7 - 4.

Glen Hewson got the Flyers off on the right foot when he scored after taking a pass from Terry Fryett and Steve Otterman. Waterloo came right back with three unanswered goals to take a 3 - 1 lead to the dressing room after the first period.

Frank Faludi scored the first goal with Blair Cloet and Norm Booth getting assists. Alan Magill was set up by Rick Hill for the next goal before Faludi got his second of the night with Cloet helping on the play. Fryett made it 3 - 2 with Ross McKeen and Dean Webb having assists. Magill got his second of the game to make it 4 - 2 and before the period ended, Magill had picked up a hat trick for a second period lead of 5 - 2. Rick Hill opened the last period with a goal as Ted Jefferies picked up his third assist. Hill

finished off the scoring for Waterloo just after the teams returned to full strength. Bob Powless was set up by Paul Fryett, then picked up his second of the night when Hewson and Fryett teamed with him for the goal. Hagersville out shot the Tri - Cats 36 - 20 but came out on the short end of the score. Coach Grant Chambers was sitting out the first game of his suspension as he had picked up a major misconduct in the game against St. George on Saturday night. This Sunday will be the last home game of the regular schedule and could well determine where or who the boys will play in the playoffs.

teacher and principal for 25 years, but for 41 years. Mr. Mitchell had, at the time of his death in August, completed 25 years as public school trustee, school board administrator, and latterly as board of education trustee.
