The High Cost Of Regionalism

"Opposition" to having the H - N region's headquarters split between Cayuga and Simcoe is using the "high cost" of setting up a communication system between the two centres as a club to beat down the idea.

Well, regardless of how we set up our regional split headquarters, with only one headquarters, or with one headquarters and a field office, we need good communication across our region. People have to be able to talk to their government. Regionalism is supposed to give us added benefits, not take away what little we do have.

An argument against regional council meetings, being held in Cayuga is that mileage will be increased 30 to 40 per cent.

I do not know whether these figures are correct or not.

However, it has been suggested to the Record that councillors shouldn't even be paid for mileage when they are travelling back and forth to work (in Cayuga) just as hydro workers, bankers and storekeepers don't get paid for travelling to work. But, when travelling on council business, that's a different story.

While this argument does have some merit and could possibly be applied at the local level, I'm sure some regional councillors would point out that they have to travel four times as far from the area they represent as others.

Another problem in the "high cost of regionalism" we haven't had to contend with yet is regional councillors salaries.

We have heard that the decrease in numbers of councillors should absorb the increased salaries of local and regional councillors.

However, in the Hamilton-Wentworth region, councillor's salaries will cost taxpayers an extra \$250,000. How much extra is it going to cost us?

It's frightening when we start figuring out all the new costs.

Maybe we should forget about the marriage councillor, ask for an annulment and just set up a regional planning board.

Ironic!

Bill 190, an act to establish regional government in Haldimand - Norfolk "symbolizes the long-discussed union of two friendly counties..." Arthur Meen, parliamentary assistant to the Treasurer of Ontario said at our inauguration in January.

"You are inheriting the spirit of good will that prevailed between leaders of Norfolk and those of Haldimand throughout the creation of your new government. I am sure that this spirit will be quickly transformed into a determination on your part to make the union work well," Intergovernmental Affairs minister John White said.

"For the Regional Government to succeed certain criteria have to be met. I suggest of prime importance is a regional council that can work together," Chairman John McCombs said.

At Simcoe Council's meeting last week, Mayor Alfred Judd said regional council's decision to hold their meetings in Cayuga will mean an additional 35 to 40 per cent more mileage. He continued,

"It's just like a spoiled brat. You give him everything he wants and sooner or later you have to give him the back of your hand to straighten him out."

Ironic - isn't it?

Walpole Purchase

Walpole township council has agreed to buy .860 of an acre on Concession 1 for \$1,000 from James and Linda Mattice of R.R. 1, Selkirk.

Walpole Expropriation

Walpole Council passed a motion resolving to expropriate land being part of Lot 4, Concession 2 in the Township of Walpole for the purpose of establishing a new Township Road from County Road 11 to Haldimand County Road No. 43.

Cottage Property

Walpole Council received a letter from the Haldimand - Norfolk Health Unit concerning a complaint by neighbours to the use of a nine unit Resort Cottage. Property owned by Mrs. E. Beal who is renting the cottages for all year round use.

According to the minutes, a "store and residence property, converted to residential use in 1972 has now been listed and sold as a Business and Residential Unit. This is not allowed either in the Township By-Law or the Minister's Freeze Order.

"An illegal Multiple Unit Dwelling listed for sale. An order by the Health Unit and Walpole Council was issued to reduce this dwelling to a two unit complex.
