Stelco

The first stage of Stelco's Nanticoke plant will add 1.3 million tons of steel to the company's steelmaking capacity by 1978 or earlier, President J.P. Gordon said last week in Toronto.

And by the end of the fourth stage in the 1980's the project is expected to cost \$2 billion, in terms of 1973 dollars.

Mr. Gordon also said the implementation of the H - N region "will significantly improve Stelco's ability to plan and coordinate the Lake Erie expansion with the development of the Haldimand - Norfolk region".

to use it. He also feels if the matter is settled before April 1st, the new Nanticoke council will have to assume responsibility for the guard.

Mr. Mackereth stressed he was in no way finding criticism with council. He said he understands their position of wanting to do what is best for the village and he can understand all the points they brought forward.

However, he considers it his job and duty to provide ideas for safety in and out of school.

Mr. Mackereth said he is not trying to erode or take away the training responsibility from the parents and school; but to increase school safety. And, he hopes it will continue.

Some have argued the establishment of a crossing guard will take away a degree of responsibility from the children. Mr. Mackereth countered the drivers of cars and trucks who are much older, have a responsibility not to speed in the village, but they still do it.

And children to and from school are not always thinking about road safety, he said. They talk and play with friends - "this is when a crossing guard is necessary".

Although accidents do happen no matter what, Mr. Mackereth questioned whether this then limits the responsibility of citizens to help prevent accidents.

He said he realizes council has to look after the entire village and there is some worry about public opinion if they look after one area and not another, but more (64) cross this busy road than in any other area of the village.

Mr. Mackereth said he realizes separate school children have to cross Highway 6 also, but he feels the bus which picks them up almost acts as a stop sign; or at least a precautionary warning.

cluding Haldimand and Norfolk Counties.

Norfolk County engineer William McDowell is the new Director of Engineering for H - N with an annual salary of \$24,500.

Mayor Judd said there were 13 applicants for this post with salaries ranging from \$13,500 to \$23,000. Mr. McDowell and Haldimand County engineer Ed Coates were the only applicants from the region.

Mr. Coates was appointed Engineer of the Roads Section at \$21,000.

Mr. McDowell and Mr. Coates present salaries are \$24,392 and \$19,000 respectively.

Burlington's planning commissioner, Roger Roberts was appointed Director of Planning of H - N at \$25,500 per annum.

It was reported received for the position with salaries ranging from \$18,200 to \$25,000.

Dan Ciona, Norfolk County clerk was already appointed H - N Chief Administrator on January 31 at \$24,000 per annum, up from \$17,000.
