## H.S.S. Teacher Met Indian Leaders In Travel Course

40 teachers travelled across Canada last summer visiting Indian historical sites, reservations, museums and talking with Indian leaders.

A Hagersville Secondary School occupation teacher was one of the group.

Marion Vardy took the practical course on Amerindian studies lead by professor Ed Newberry of the Sudbury College of Laurentian University and Indian leader Art Solomon.

Professor Newberry, who organized this course and has worked very hard for the Indian was, at one time, a United Church minister in Jarvis.

The aim of the course

was to understand justice in relation to the native people of Canada, especially in the areas of education, language, land, law and spiritual liberty.

In an attempt to fulfil this aim, Mrs. Vardy travelled with the group 5,000 miles by chartered bus, 150 miles by ferry and 2,000 miles by air.

The venture was sponsored by the Ontario Teachers Federation, organized by Laurentian University and the cost of \$900 a person was borne by the teachers.

They visited 21 centres across Canada and interviewed 39 Indian leaders.

Mrs. Vardy is very

enthusiastic about her summer experience. "I really enjoyed it," she told the Record. "If anyone has the money, it's the best way to spend it.... You could spend as much or as little money as possible."

Laurentian broke new ground when it accepted the OTF proposal to offer the course in travel form. And Mrs. Vardy thinks we'll see more travel and study combinations because it is such a good method of educating. It has also helped her to understand the children in this area.

Of course the program also involved a lot of extra reading and research.
