

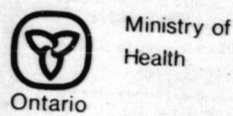
# Jim And Mary Win Trophy

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They entered ten-eight Durocs and two Landraces - at the Waterloo station "to find out where we're going with certain blood lines."

The group was not entered with the hope of bringing home a prize. "We certainly didn't expect it," Jim said.

They entered, he continued, because the tests do give a personal appraisal of a farmer's herd; he sees how his herd places in competition with those from all across Ontario and it can be a form of good advertising.

His entry had an average 1.87 pounds of gain a day with a back fat probe of .72 inches. And, they had a feed conversion of 245 lb. of feed per 100 pounds of gain.

The Field's own a 75 acre farm near Jarvis (just off the Town line) which is presently under option by a consortium of developers for a proposed satellite city. They bought the farm in 1969 and started buying purebred pigs in 1970.

Approximately 1,000 piglets are born there a year. The litter average for 1973 was 9.4 weaned.

Jim and Mary only raise weaners to keep for breeding stock. The rest are sold either at the door or through sales. Mary is secretary of the Ontario Duroc Breeders association.

The Field's "farrow to finish operation" keeps both of them busy. Mary helps with the farrowing and keeping the records straight, which is almost a full-

time job in itself, Jim explained, since both breeds are in R.O.P. (Record of Production). Jim describes the Landrace as a good pig and says it is particularly favored in this area.

However, he expects the Duroc to grow in popularity because of its good feed conversion, meat quality and potential as a crossing strain. He also likes them better because they are easy to handle, good mothers and a lean type of pig.

Community Centre

Councillor Robert Gedye isn't satisfied with the answer council received from its lawyer on the question of a "thoroughfare" located on land owned by R.F. Almas Co.

Council asked their counsel about the village's legal rights to continue using the land beside the Community Centre as a "thoroughfare" as has been done

for over ten years in the past.

The lawyer's reply said the land was owned by R. F. Almas Co. However, since the land has been used by the Community Centre for so long, he suggested council negotiate.

Mr. Gedye said council already knows who owns it and don't question that.

"We asked a legal question, or we thought we did and he didn't answer that," he said. Mr. Gedye noted both sides have the same lawyer.

Council decided to question again whether the Almas Company has the legal right to fence and close off the "thoroughfare".

Water Tank

Oneida reeve Frank Peart sent a letter to council expressing concern over an article, which was printed in both the Record and Hagersville Press last week, where Fire Chief Bill McClarty said rural service has been cut 75 per cent because the water truck has been drained and has no storage building.

Councillor Norm Crawford disputed this. The water truck is in the market square and near a hydrant so it can be filled rapidly, he said. "It's in good condition and winterized".

Councillors felt the truck could be filled almost as fast as it would take to get the keys to a heated garage and drive the truck out.
