History of Hagersville

MUNICIPAL OFFICE

It was on Sunday, February 12, 1967, Canada's Centennial Year, that the new municipal office was officially opened, with the Honourable James N. Allan, provincial member of parliament for Haldimand-Norfolk, cutting the ribbon.

The new building was designed by Mr. Leonard Hugst, and cost \$70,000. The building houses the town Clerk's office, the Police office and the council chambers. The former building was approximately one hundred years old, having served as a hotel,

service station and a municipal office. In 1920, the land and building, formerly on the town hall site, were purchased from John W. Slack by the Village of Hagersville for \$7,500.
