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H-N Regional Council Sets Committee Structure

The wheels for the administrative organization of the Regional Municipality of Haldimand - Norfolk were set in motion last Thursday.

At an all-day meeting in Cayuga, the H-N regional council set up a committee structure and appointed members to serve on each of their four committees.

They also made plans for the hiring of top personnel and voted in two councillors to serve on the Police Commission.

Mayor Charles Lundy of the Town of Dunnville and councillor Roy Whitehead of the Town of Simcoe will be working on the five-man commission.

In making the four committee decision, council rejected an earlier recommendation for three committees (planning, engineering and social services) and a Committee of the Whole to handle finance.

Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd spoke in favor of a finance and admin-

istration committee, saying he felt the committee of the whole (19 members) would be a bit cumbersome. Also, he felt there are certain things which should not be discussed in the presence of the press. Councillors Cathryn Smale of Simcoe and John Roxburgh of Nanticoke made a motion, which carried, favoring the fourth committee.

Mayor Judd also recommended each committee be increased to (continued on page 5)
