

as long as nonsmokers. The typical cigar smoker, says the report, smokes fewer than five cigars a day, while the average pipe smoker fills his pipe about 20 times daily. But neither cigar nor pipe smokers inhale. As a result, their rates of emphysema, chronic bronchitis, coronary heart disease and lung cancer are not as high as cigarette smokers.
