REGIONAL TREASURER

The Regional Treasurer will be responsible for determining the capital requirements for all municipal and associated bodies financed through the Regional played games of the day funicipality and for developing plans for meeting ese requirements. He will also be responsible for dvising Council and related Boards and Commission n financial matters, directing all municipal ecounting functions, co-ordinating the preparation f operating and capital budgets, and developing and elementing effective management controls and nformation systems.

A sound knowledge of municipal finance i sential, particularly in the areas of debenture financing and fund accounting. A knowledge of computer processing techniques and accounting systems design would be highly desirable. DIRECTOR OF PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT


