

Cayuga Judge To Head Flooding Probe

County Court Judge W.W. Leach of Cayuga said last week that the Ontario Government has asked him to head a restructured inquiry into recent floods on the Grand River.

He said he expects his appointment will be officially announced this week but would not say when public hearings would begin.

Dr. Andrew Booth, president of Lakehead University in Thunder Bay, originally was in charge of the inquiry but halted proceedings

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The new inquiry will be held under the Public Inquiries Act which will permit witnesses to be subpoenaed and to testify under oath with the protection of the evidence acts.

Eugene Whelan Speaks At Courtland

Some 200 persons along with Dave Marshall, Liberal candidate were at the Lions Park in Courtland to greet Hon. Eugene Whelan, Minister of Agriculture when he arrived by helicopter to speak at the Liberal Barbecue.

Mr. Whelan stated, the budget which was defeated held good legislation for the people such as legislation for young farmers between ages of 18 - 35 to assist in agriculture advance payments for all storage crops, the same as wheat.

He said "We are a productive society and we must remain a productive society. We can increase our production by 50% in five years if agriculture is given a stable return for produce. There is a definite problem in getting people to work in Agriculture - Labor pools have been formed. 1102's - permits are going to be renewed. Society's job as a whole is giving security - developing programs for those who want to work. If we have a healthy agriculture society we have a healthy society in general, he said.

Board Of Education Notes

At the Board of Education meeting in Cayuga on June 7.

The Management Committee recommended a new health booklet on venereal disease, published by the Pfizer Company, be made available to all schools in the system.

The Management Committee reported the Swimming program conducted for Haldimand School students, through the kindness of Dr. David Marshall in lending his pool, was a success in the 1973 - 74 year.

The Property Committee reported there are still deficiencies in the Parkway building project and they are holding back \$604.55.

The concrete floors have been poured at Northview School and their new addition closed in. A corridor ceiling was ruined from extensive leaking of the roof and the architect has requested the contractor to replace it.

The Board accepted the tender of Emmac Construction Limited to

handle facilities for sewage disposal at \$9,014.

The Board accepted the tender of Midlakes Piping to convert two heavy oil burning burners at Hagersville Secondary School to natural gas for \$14,155.

An agreement was reached between the Service employees and the Haldimand Board of Education on salaries.

The new contract gives a 35 cent per hour increase to all employees effective July 1, 1974, a further 10 cent an hour increase effective September 1, 1974 and a final 25 cent an hour increase effective January 1, 1975.

Fringe benefits covering OHIP have been increased from 66 2/3 per cent to 75 per cent participation by the Board.

A new transportation formula was adopted with the basic bus price being 61 passenger bus and under - \$3,500 plus 37 cents per mile; over 61 to 67 inclusive \$3,600 and 38 cents per mile and over 67 - \$3,700 and 39 cents per mile.

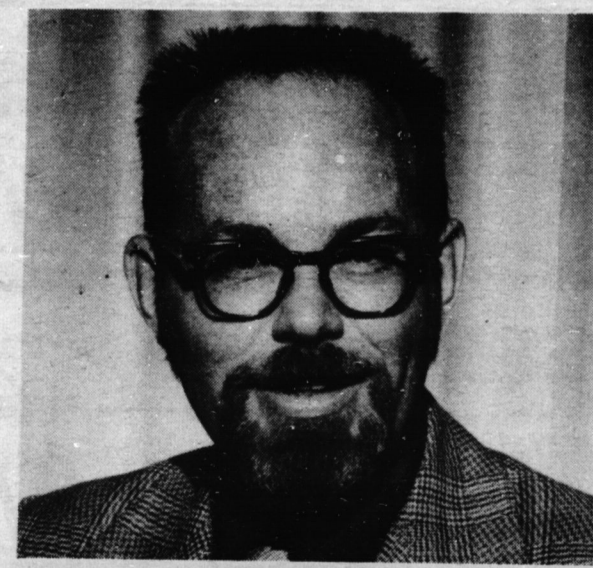
