Blues Strengthen Hold On First Place

The Hagersville Blues took a firm hold on first place in the S.C.B.A. Senior League with a 7-3 win over Paris on Tuesday night. The win for the Blues was their 8th in ten starts this year and gives them a four point cushion over the second place Walsingham Senators.

The win was marred by a slight altercation in the late innings when Jack Harris came back into the Hagersville second baseman Larry Atkinson. Atkinson was making his first start of the season for the Blues and was sent sprawling by Harris. Jim Herkimer was on his way in from centre field and took offence with the way Harris man-handled his team mate. Herkimer and Harris ended up on the sidelines for the rest of the evening when they were both ejected. Big Lou just shrugged it off as part of a day's work playing second.

Hagersville broke up a close 3-1 ball game in the 5th inning when they scored four times. They had scored a run in the 3rd and two more in the 4th.

The Paris Sportsmen scored a single run in each of the 1st, 5th, and 7th innings.

Bob Lickers and Cliff Chrysler limited the Paris team to four hits and four walks. They struck out 12 batters with the Blues making three errors.

Rick Hume and Ken Barker had a double and single for the losers.

Harold Taylor and Danny Forbes paced the Hagersville attack with two hits apiece. Robbie Stewart powered home run to go along with a double by Frank Vecero.

Butch DeMille, Jim Cote, Chrysler and Lickers picked up the other hits.

Lelliott Wins In Export 'A' Event

Norm Lelliott of Toronto, driving the Carling sponsored 1974 Camaro, won the rain-shortened fourth event of the rich Export 'A' Trophy Series held Friday night at Cayuga International Speedway.

The win was worth \$1,000 of the total evening's purse of \$7,570.

The scheduled 100 lap race for the NASCAR-Canada Late Model "Super Stocks" was halted by rain on lap 95, immediately after Jerry Makara of Ancaster had blown the engine in his '74 Camaro, while running in second spot.

Fighting for control of his mount in the oil, Makara took two of the lapped cars into the first turn wall with him, bringing out the yellow. Makara was credited for 14th spot in the final results one lap down.

The rain prevented a developing showdown for the lead involving Lelliott, Makara, Harold Brown of Brantford and Terry Kitchen of Burlington. Kitchen had worked his '74 Camaro to fourth spot from dead last after pulling into the pits during an earlier red flag period for adjustments on lap 32.

Following this pit stop Kitchen easily powered his Norris Yates Racing Enterprises racer past most of the other competitors while gaining two-tenths of a second on the leader on every lap.

After Makara's mishap, the cars were only able to complete one lap under the yellow, before the rain forced the early checkered flag.

The win was the second for Lelliott who set the fast time of the day during time trials at 21.453 seconds, equivalent to 105.13 mph. He had also won the opening event of the series May 25th at Delaware International Speedway near London, Ontario.

Makara won the second and third events at Checker Flag Raceway in Windsor on June 2nd and at Delaware on June 22nd. The fifth event of the nine race series is slated for Checker Flag on July 14th and the sixth scheduled for Mosport Park, July 20th-21st.

Cayuga will host a 200 lap event in the series on August 5th with the finale, a 250 lap event for a \$17,000 purse, also scheduled for Cayuga on Labor Day, September 2nd.

Following Lelliott across the finish line was Harold Brown in the new 1973 Hopton and Brown Racing Team Camaro, sponsored by Gray's Magnavox in Brantford. Kitchen took third spot followed by Bill Watson of Toronto in a 1973 Firebird and Jack Monaghan of Windsor in a '73 Camaro.

Five caution flags during the race kept the leaders bunched together and aided Kitchen's charge from

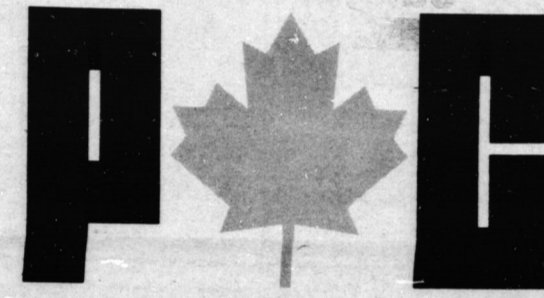
Scott Winger led the Hagersville batters with two hits. Jeff Myke and Randy Davey had a double each with singles going to Jeff Winger and Steven Racher.
