Juveniles Lose To Ingersoll

The Hagersville Juveniles blew a 3-0 lead and finally lost 4-3 to Ingersoll in the only game they played last week.

Hagersville scored three times in the second inning. Pat Martin led off with a double. Chuck Anderson hit a high chopper to the infield that went for a base hit. Dave House hit a smash to third that was too hot to handle. He loaded the bases. Craig Vanni struck out before Herby Brant stroked a single to plate two runs. Dean Webb moved both runners up a base before Danny Donato hit a long drive to centre field. House scored easily, but Brant fell down rounding third and when he could not regain his footing was tagged out.

This was the last time the team threatened in the game as Collins was in control.

Ingersoll picked up two runs off Pat Martin in the second inning on an error as well as two walks and only one base hit.

They earned one hit and two errors and a run in the 3rd and scored the winning run in the 5th. One out, Ingersoll got a single and moved to second with a base on balls. After a fly ball, the winners came through with another single and that was all the scoring.

The Juveniles play at home Thursday night (tonight) against Paris with game time at 6.30. The Juveniles are also selling tickets on a money bat worth \$100. All of the players have tickets.

Fehrman Is 'Hub' Of Harvesters

Coach Hub Fehrman returned to the Harvesters lineup and with him came their second straight win over top notch competition. This time it was a solid 10-5 win over Simcoe.

For Jarvis this was knocking off the first and second place teams in the western division in two straight nights. For Hub coming in relief of his kid brother Darryl, it was his second brilliant performance in two nights.

Jarvis wasted little time in putting this game on ice as they scored two runs in the first inning off M.C. starter Ken Misener. Craddock was safe at second when Dave McNally dropped his fly ball in centre field leading off. Bryan Smith walked and Marv Fehrman struck out. Prince fielded to short centre, but Fred McKeen came through with a double to score both runs.

Bruce Biggar was hit by a pitch and scored in the second inning when Craddock doubled. Singles by Graham, McKeen, Prince and Craddock, plus two walks and a hit batter gave the Harvesters three runs in the 3rd.

Bryan Smith, who has been swinging a hot bat since returning from his honeymoon (six hits in two games), started the fourth with a base hit. Fehrman walked and Ken Graham was hit by a pitch. A wild pitch plated Prince for the 9th run of the game. Smith's third hit of the game scored Craddock who had walked for the final Jarvis run in the 7th.

Darryl Fehrman started for the Harvesters and deserved a better fate than he got. He allowed two hits in the first inning and two more in the second inning, but was tough in the clutch.

Frank McNally then singled for what should have been the first legitimate base runner. Cote reached on an error and Haggith doubled chasing Darryl. Hub came on and struck out Lea and Crandall. A single by Misener and a triple by Haggith gave the Simcoe team a run in the 6th but this was all they got.

It seems the Simcoe team was too busy crying about every pitch and every call to play any kind of good baseball. If their bats were as big as their mouths, they might have made more of their 11 hits. Even their coach who is a seasoned sportsman around Simcoe had rabbit ears for some of the fans.

If the Simcoe team can grow up and act their age we might be treated to some good games the rest of the season.

Jarvis will play at Six Nations on Thursday night before hosting Delhi on Saturday night.

Harvesters Defeat Tillsonburg

The Jarvis Harvesters played a make up game with the first place Tillsonburg Merchants at Oneida and came away with a well earned 3-2 win.

This was the first game back for playing coach Hub Fehrman and he showed why the boys have been in a slump lately as he gave the whole team a lift.

Hub was not at his best. He allowed six hits with R. Todd the only one to get two hits. The portly hurler struck out only seven, but did not issue a base on balls.

The visitors scored their two runs in the 7th inning when they got two hits and an error by the Harvesters. This was the last threat for the Merchants as Hub faced only seven men in the last two innings.

Jarvis got three hits in the first inning but did not score a run. Brian Smith singled and stole second. Ted Phibbs hit a shot to right field and when Smith tried to score was thrown out at the plate. Bill Prince followed with a double as Fred McKeen grounded out to end the inning.

Bruce Biggar singled in the second and Smith got his second hit of the night in the 3rd to keep Todd in trouble, but nothing he wasn't equal to.

Jim Lamb picked up a hit in the 4th but was left on third. In the 5th the Harvesters got their first run. Dennis Craddock came through with a double to lead off. Smith grounded out before Ted Phibbs was hit by a pitch. Bill Prince got his second hit of the night to plate Craddock.

Biggar walked to open the 6th. Lamb struck out and Fehrman sacrificed Biggar along. Craddock was safe on an error.

This set the stage for Bryan Smith to come through with his third hit of the night to plate the winning runs. Todd, who leads the league in strike outs, was not at his best in this game as he picked up only seven while walking two. The nine hits for Jarvis off Todd prove the boys are starting to find the eye that has been missing all year.

Blues Bow To Bruder In 12th

The Hagersville Blues played their best ball of the season for 11 innings on Sunday before making two errors in the 12th and giving the Simcoe Giants a 2-0 victory.

Jim Bruder and Ross McKeen hooked up in an old fashioned pitching duel for nine innings with neither team able to score.

Ross gave up a first inning single and two more hits in the second inning. Mawhney got his second hit of the game in the 5th to go along with three walks. These were the only base runners for Simcoe till the 10th inning.

In the 10th, Bruder led off with his second hit of the game and Mawhney followed with a base hit. At this point coach Petracca called in Paul Kett to pitch and moved Dennis Wilson in to catch.

Kett threw only nine pitches and they were all strikes. This retired the side. It looked like Kett would be the hero and the coach had found a good fireman. Kett struck out two more in the 11th and two more in the 12th for a total of seven in the three innings work.

In the 12th, Bruder and Tatarca picked up back to back singles with nobody out. On the second hit the relay came to third and the attempted throw back to second went into centre field with one runner scoring and the second runner going to third where he scored on a passed ball.

As we said, Kett blew two down on strikes after this and a soft fly to short ended the Simcoe 12th.

Hagersville had two chances to score but Bruder was equal to both occasions. In the 9th Butch DeMille got the first hit off Bruder

with no one out. Jim Cote went in to run for him and promptly stole second. McKeen sacrificed him to third with only one out. Herkimer, who has been hitting at a 500 clip since the season started, struck out and Wilson grounded out to end the threat.

Wilson, who hit the ball hard all day, led off the last of the 12th with none out. Tony Yacobino was almost the hero when he hit a long drive to centre field. It was pulled in by Doug MacDonald. Wilson went to third after the catch, but he died there as Kett and Vecero got out to end the game.

The nine innings were played in only an hour and a half for some of the best ball seen around here in a long time.

The next action will be here this Sunday with game time 2 p.m.

H-N Police Report

Atoms Split Games

The following is the Activity Report for June 1974 from Division Two (Hagersville - Caledonia) of the Haldimand - Norfolk Regional Police.

During the official first month of summer there were 15 motor vehicle collisions investigated by the members of this division, nine of these collisions were reportable (over \$200), six were non-reportable and there were personal injuries to two persons.

There were 222 traffic warnings issued and 99 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act. Under the Liquor Control Act, there were 15 charges laid; under other provincial statutes three; and under the Criminal Code of Canada, 21.

The officers responded to 228 occurrences, seven requests for property surveillance, 18 requests for assistance, and one escort was provided. During their security checks, they found 16 premises to be unlocked. They investigated 15 complaints regarding lost and found property, three reports of missing adults, and five reports of auto and bicycle theft. There were 37 arrests made, 28 summonses served and on 15 occasions assisted other police departments. 7700 miles were logged on the department vehicles for patrol duties in Caledonia and Hagersville.

MESSAGE: The summer months bring out the bicyclists and age is no barrier to the enjoyment of this increasingly popular form of recreation. The bicycle is a vehicle under law and must be operated as such. It is to be operated on the roadway, unless prohibited by law, with the flow of traffic. Other vehicular traffic must allow bicyclists sufficient room to pass, and cyclists must allow other vehicles sufficient room to pass.

When operated after sunset, there must be a lighted white or amber lamp on the front, a red lighted lamp or reflector on the rear, and white reflective tape on the front forks, red reflective tape on the rear forks. It must have a bell or horn to warn pedestrians and others of its approach, and it must not carry more than one person if designed for one person only. Do Not operate your Bicycle On A Sidewalk.
