Three Fires In Area

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen were called Saturday, June 29th in the early evening hours to the farm of Marc Stephenson, R.R. 5, Hagersville. The blaze completely destroyed the large frame barn. The Jarvis Fire Department also arrived at the scene on the Haldimand - Norfolk townline.

The Hagersville fire-fighting crew were called on Tuesday, June 25th at 3.54 p.m. to a fire situated in a lumber pile in the Quarry Pit at the extreme end of Porter Avenue. It is a known fact that children started this flame outburst which was extinguished by the firemen upon their arrival, resulting in no damage.

Once again on Saturday night, July 6th at 11:50 p.m. the Hagersville brigade was called to another barn fire on the Clarence Fess farm, R.R. 4, Jarvis. The large frame barn was completely in flames upon the arrival of the firemen. It was impossible to save either the barn or drive - shed. Roy Fess, son of Clarence, now owns the farm where the mishap occurred.

Cause of the fire is under investigation. It resulted in the loss of a large quantity of tires, several snowmobiles, threshing combine and other equipment.

The Fisherville Fire Department was called by Hagersville since the scene of the fire is in their territory. Upon their arrival and complete setting - up, the Hagersville crew returned to Hagersville.

However, the Hagersville Fire Chief, Bill McClarty stated, "those who come as sightseers only to a fire certainly make it virtually impossible to get through. Such was the

case at this fire when the Fisherville fire-truck could not get through the volume of cars on the road, and the Hagersville trucks couldn't get back out through all the traffic. This was caused from the two fire departments being called, with many cars following each; and in some cases plain failure of co-operation by spectators."

The Fire Chief further stated, "should it have been necessary to get an ambulance through that maze of traffic, it would have been impossible."

W.I. Tours Potteries

The Hagersville Womens' Institute held their June meeting at the Mohawk Potteries on the Six Nations Reserve.

Present were 13 ladies and one gentleman for this interesting tour of the shop, where Mrs. Montour does her clay work.

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Choralairs Represent Canada

HALDIMAND - The Choralairs were Canada's unofficial representative to the 28th annual International Music Eisteddfod at Llangollen, Wales, which ended Saturday.

The choir, under direction of George Shippey, was the only Canadian entry in the five-day festival, which attracts about 200 choral groups annually from 20 to 30 countries to compete in traditional and ethnic folk arts.

Results of the competitions likely will be announced this week.

Officials say that since the Eisteddfod was first presented on an international basis in 1947, more than 5,000 choirs and folkdance groups from more than 50 countries have participated.

The Choralairs, whose basically spiritual sound has been recorded twice with a third album scheduled for September, selected the country - gospel song, He Is There, for the competition.

The music was written by Ralph Cruickshank of Toronto, president of the Berandol Music publishing firm, with lyrics by Robert Liddell of Cambridge, Ont. Mr. Liddell has been recognized for his country and spiritual works on the Word label with the King James Version, and on his own Dawn of Creation label.

Two years ago the Leamington Choral Society from Leamington, Ont., took third prize at the Llangollen Eisteddfod, the first time a Canadian group placed in the top bracket.

O.P.P. Initiate Crime Prevention Program

A crime prevention program is being initiated in Jarvis and all other areas under the jurisdiction of the Cayuga Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police.

Ontario's Solicitor General, George Kerr, announced Tuesday this new program is being implemented all across the province in areas covered by the O.P.P. And it will be coordinated by the Community Services Branch in Toronto.

The intent of the program is to intensify the force's efforts at preventing crime.

Once the program is underway, the Cayuga Detachment will be distributing informative crime prevention mat-

erial on home, property and personal protection.

And, their Community Services Officer will be welcoming invitations to speak with any interested group, club, association or business.

Constable Bert Bell, already well-known in the area as safety officer, is the officer responsible for this.

Staff Sergeant William Potter told The Record Thursday Mr. Bell had already spent

a few hours in Jarvis Wednesday talking to business owners and the bank manager.

He gave an example of how the program could help the businessman.

Business establishments are checked by day and night, he said. Mr. Bell may recommend lights being put at the back of the shop, steel bars put on a lower window or the installation of a fire alarm to prevent entry.

In the near future, Sergeant Potter said, Mr. Bell will be attending a special course. He will also be involved in crime conferences,

an identification unit, (finger printing and photography) and with the detective sergeant on crime, reprinting and handling.

Controller Bell may be in uniform, plains clothes, marked car or unmarked car depending on the situation, Sergeant Potter added.

Mr. Kerr said officers throughout the province will work in close cooperation with local governments, citizens' groups, businesses, individual citizens and the media to unify community resources and police efforts to reduce crime.

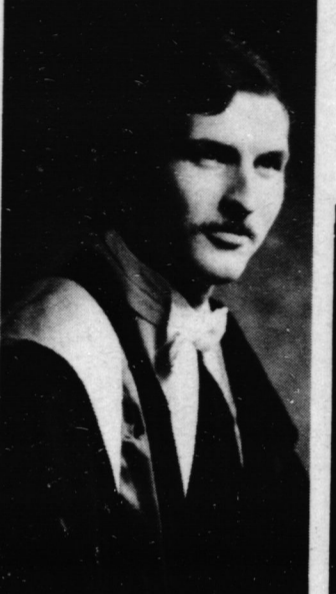
