In the group II pool however, even though the production per farm per day increased from 312 to 374 pounds, the number of producers (61) leaving the business during the three years was large enough to reduce the total annual production by almost 900,000 pounds of milk.

The Town of Simcoe has notified the council of the City of Nanticoke asking for a grant of \$1,200.00 as residents of this municipality use facilities in Simcoe for swimming pool, ball league, minor hockey, and figure skating.

Various members of Nanticoke council cited instances when residents of Simcoe used recreational facilities in Port Dover and Waterford - therefore the \$1,200.00 request was refused.

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region was wise to seek housing action assistance to speed up development of more homes in the region.

What the plan will do, he said, is offer the developer incentives through speed in application processing to reduce the cost of housing as well as offer some financial assistance to the municipalities.

The co-ordinator said he and his staff were surprised by the interest shown by developers in the program, including four who made concrete proposals for housing in the region.

The developers would have to provide 10 per cent of the lots in a subdivision for Home Ownership Made Easy housing, he said, and 30 per cent for the \$14,500 \$20,000 a year income bracket. What the developer did with the rest, said Mr. Hamilton, would be up to him.

In turn the program would offer the municipalities tax stabilization grants of \$600 for each HOME lot, \$525 for each \$14,500 to \$20,000 income lot, and

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
