## \$650 Lot Levy

After kicking it around for a month the City of Nanticoke council has tentatively set local lot levies at \$650.

After a lengthy discussion council decided on the figure and will send it to the planning and advisory committee for further consideration. This committee will also look at the former Port Dover and Waterloo subdividers' agreements to come up with fees for such buildings as duplexes, apartments and townhouses. City engineer Ed

Coates started the discussion with a proposal that set many of the councillors in a near state of shock. He started with a theoretical town of 3,500 to 4,000 population that was surrounded by proposed subdivisions and nearby an industrial complex.

As he talked it became apparent that his theoretical town was actually Port Dover.

"So let's talk about the consequences of doubling (population) of what we have here", Mr. Coates said. He listed a variety of services that would be needed to service the subdivision such as a fire hall, swimming pool, library expansion and an arena.

"Now if you add those costs up, and there may be more, you end up with a grand total of \$2,410,000," he said.

"Pretty well all of this has been brought about by what happened out here," he said pointing to a drawing that looked like the Ontario Hydro Nanticoke Generating Station.

He suggested that the average lot levy would have to be \$2,190 to cover all of the added expenses. He said the industry that is attracting the people there in the first place could pay 60 per cent, or \$1,320, of the lot levy, and the buyer 40 per cent, or \$880.

"I don't know whether it's right or wrong but I have heard of this 60 per cent industrial and 40 per cent residential balance," he said. The councillors did not seem to think Mr. Coates' argument was reasonable and decided to set the lot levy at \$650, pending the consideration of the committee.

Last week I told you a few laws of the game of Lawn Bowling so I will tell you a few more this week.

**The Mat** - The Mat shall be of a definite size, namely 24 inches long and 14 inches wide.

**The Jack** - The Jack shall be round and white, with a diameter of not less than 2 1/2 inches, nor more than 2 7/32 inches, and not less than 8 ounces, nor more than 10 ounces in weight.

**The Bowls** - (A) Bowls shall be made of wood, rubber or composition

and shall be black or brown in colour, and each bowl of the set shall bear the member's individual and distinguishing mark on each side. Bowls made of wood (lignum vitae) shall not exceed 16 1/2 inches in circumference nor 3 1/2 lb. in weight. Loading of bowls made of wood is strictly prohibited.

**(b) Bias of Bowls** - The Master Bowl shall have a Bias approved by the International Bowling Board. A Bowl shall have a Bias not less than that of the Master Bowl, and shall bear the imprint of the Stamp of the International Bowling Board. To ensure accuracy of bias and visibility of stamp, all bowls shall be re-tested and re-stamped at least once every ten years.

**The Footwear** - Players, Umpires and Markers shall wear brown or black smooth rubber soled, heel - less footwear, while playing on the Green or acting as Umpires or Markers.
