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only have we shown that we can unite, but that we can protest in sufficient strength to shake the tree of government itself." Mr. Cronin told the teachers. "Next year we may even knock off the rotten apples..."

It is time the teaching community became as identifiable and active as the church and service clubs they now support, he said.

"You have been educated and trained to identify the issues, to perceive the outcome, to pursue ideas to their logical conclusion. You are professionals. Why then confine your talents to the classroom?"

Mr. Cronin said one suggestion being considered by the Provincial Executive is the establishment of

a corporation, legally independent of the Federation and supported by voluntary contributions. Its purpose would be to create an awareness of and focus attention on the development of educational systems throughout Ontario and the political implication of government involvement in such systems in a democratic society.

price system is helping the people out there and it should in other areas.... such as forest products, he said.

Mr. Walpole feels the Prices Review Board should also have the power to roll back prices.

Speculation is a "pet peeve" of Mr. Walpole. And he would like to see "speculative profits taxed to the point where it is really discouraged as a business". He suggested land banking and giving municipalities the right to expropriate as alternate means of getting land for new housing.

An average home is "\$52,000 in Toronto". Mr. Walpole feels that is too high.

Land banking will end up as a housing gain, he said, and "one tax that has to go is the 11% on building materials".

Farmers do not have to suffer in an effort to gain more space for housing. But, if a farm is worth X number of dollars for agriculture, there is no reason why it should be three times greater when purchased for housing, he said.

Farmers should be paid well plus relocation expenses.
