

Firemen Kept Active

A concerned area resident called the Hagersville Volunteer Firemen in the early morning hours of Tuesday, May 21, to the First Line of the Six Nations Reservation.

An unoccupied house, owned by Harvey LaForme, was completely gutted by fire. This fire call was received by the Detachment at 12:12 a.m. with the firefighters responding immediately.

During the course of their activities at the LaForme house fire, they were also alerted to another fire in progress on the First Line of Oneida, near the overhead bridge. There, an automobile stolen from Brantford had been deliberately set afire. Police are investigating this incident.

The firemen were called to the residence of Robert Sommerville, 75 King Street East on

Thursday, May 23 at 12:30 p.m. Damage occurred to the siding on the house when fire erupted in a pile of roofing which was lying on the ground. Workmen were in the process of re-roofing the house.

On Saturday, June 1, at 2:50 p.m. the Hagersville Volunteer Firemen were called by a passer-by regarding a burning stump at the side of the road. This call was to the farm of Stanley Petetski of R.R. # 4, Hagersville.

Regional Police contacted the Hagersville firefighting crew in the early morning hours of Sunday, June 2, to an automobile fire on Burbridge Sideroad, off the Indian Line, west of Hagersville. The Pontiac vehicle was completely gutted from the fire. It is under investigation.

THE HAGERSVILLE LIONS POOL

Located in the park, the Lions Club pool was officially opened on August 28, 1969. The cost of the pool was \$60,000., \$8,215. of which was raised by a successful walkathon on June 22, 1969. A.C. Smith was the oldest person to attempt the nineteen mile walk, and he made it. The balance was raised by a trade fair held in the summer of '69, public donations and pledges.

The pool has proved to be a great success, and is enjoyed by the citizens.

THE ARENA

The arena, a worthwhile project of Hagersville, was built in 1956. Canvassers from the HAAA collected for the arena building fund, and interested citizens donated time and money, resulting in the building, and the regular improvements that have been made since the opening of the arena. Since its opening, a heating system, new lighting, a broadcasting

booth and electric score boards have been added. Winter activities include hockey, public skating and skating lessons. The building is also used for community and social functions.

LAWN BOWLING GREEN

Mr. Henry Byers, Mr. Mason, Mr. Bill Anderson and David N. Almas were the founders of the Lawn Bowlers' Club of Hagersville. They bowled on a lot directly behind Graham's Service Station. These men bought the land on Almas green is now located in 1917, and the activities moved.

The popularity of the sport has fluctuated over the years, but in the 1920's some kind of membership peak was reached, and often the bowling teams would continue all night long. The present membership of the club is forty-three, but there have been times when the membership totalled only seven or eight.

Dedicate Signs

Reverend Granville Taylor-Munro of Jarvis will unveil and dedicate a centennial sign at Knox and Chalmers churches Sunday in honor of the 100th birthday of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Both signs will be erected in front of their

respective churches. The Chalmers service will begin at 10 a.m. and the Knox service at 11 a.m.

It was almost a century ago when Canadian Presbyterians, reflecting various British, Continental European and American influences, joined to form the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

In June 1875, five hundred commissioners representing the four presbyterian denominations in Canada met in Victoria Hall, Montreal, for the first General Assembly.

Rev. Taylor - Munro said as of the end of 1972, there were 800 presbyterian congregations in Canada and approximately 180,000 members.
