## Project SWEEP Underway

Project SWEEP (Students Working in an Environmental Enhancement Program) will again operate in 1974, as part of the Ontario Government's special summer student employment program-- Experience '74.

Project SWEEP 1974 is working in conjunction with the Long Point Region Conservation Authority to provide additional jobs for students during the summer months.

A total of 45 students from secondary and post-secondary educational programs will form the two main work forces. Technical and labour.

The majority of the students will be employed in the conservation development part of the program in Authority Conservation Areas while a staff of four labourers will be involved in co-operative environmental enhancement activities with the local municipalities.
