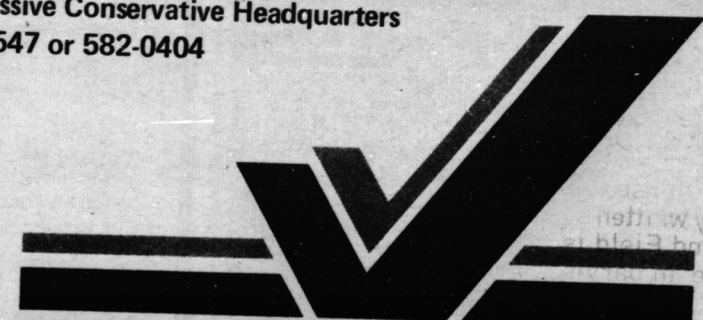

Walpole Speaks On Corporations And Other Businesses

The New Democratic Party is often considered as being Anti-Business. Nothing could be further from the truth, says Norman Walpole, H-N NDP candidate. No party has more concern for farmers and small businessmen. It is opposed to the 'marriage' of government and large corporations.

What it does oppose is such situations as the following, he said last week:

While corporation taxes and personal income taxes were once approximately equal, that situation has changed. Now, for every dollar paid in taxes by corporations, three dollars is paid through personal income taxes. While 44% of government revenue comes from personal income tax only 14% comes from

taxes on corporation profits.

While taxes on corporation profits is set at approximately 49%, they end up paying only 12% due to fast write offs, tax deferrals and other such schemes. Even a worker earning \$4,000 pays tax at a rate of 15%, a higher rate than corporations.

While savings are dwindling and wages are increasing moderately, prices and corporation profits are soaring. Countless instances of record profits and unjustifiable profit increases could be cited. To name only a few --- Imperial Oil profits up 100%, Noranda Mines up 75% and Inco up 107% and the list could go on and on.

It is a myth to talk of free enterprise, when a few corporations control each sector of

the business community. In 1971, the average income of small businessmen was \$7,442, while self-employed doctors were earning \$39,555 and even self-employed salesmen were earning \$8,766.

Mr. Walpole said a New Democratic Government would -

Reform the tax system to make large corporations pay their fair share so individuals and small businessmen would not have to pay more than their fair share. (The Liberals and Conservatives joined forces twice during the last parliament to thwart achievement of this objective).

Direct a fair share of investment capital into housing, farms and small businesses.

Curb excessive or misleading advertising to protect small bus-

inences from unfair competition.

Set up a new division of the Department of Trade and Commerce to

help small businesses by keeping them informed of economic trends, informing them of technological chan-

ges, providing technical advice and assistance and simplifying government forms required of small businesses.



Ontario believes that residents 65 or over, the blind and the disabled should have an income of at least \$2600 a year.

In July, Ontario will introduce a Special Benefits program. It will place extra funds on top of federal Guaranteed Income Supplements—enough to guarantee the elderly who are qualified residents of Ontario an income of \$2600 a year. Blind and disabled people who qualify for Family Benefits will also be entitled to these special benefits.

Beginning September 1, approved drugs prescribed by a doctor or dentist will be available, free of charge, to those qualifying for the special benefits outlined above, Family Benefits or the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement. Drug cards will be mailed automatically. You don't have to apply for them.

Who will receive these special benefits?

If you are 65 or over
(with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you now receive both Old Age Security and the Guaranteed Income Supplement...

you will receive your benefits cheque each month, automatically. You do not have to apply for it.

If you are 65 or over
(with an annual income of less than \$2600)...and you do not receive any federal income supplement... please give us a call.
