* Council agreed that a 15 cent mileage expense be paid to all councillors for travelling to council meetings and other meetings pertaining to regional council business and this expense apply to all department heads and administrator when travelling on regional business.

* The Chief administrator be authorized to use a further \$3,500 for temporary partitioning of office space, stationery and minor office supplies.

placed the clerk's office and chambers in the Woodhouse building, Treasurer in Port Dover and Public Works in Jarvis.

The advantages, he pointed out, were that the Port Dover and Woodhouse buildings are right across the street from one another and the ratepayer wouldn't have to bear such a heavy financial burden.

Mr. Scott rebutted the people would suffer by a three building split because it's an "inefficient proposition".

John Roxburgh spoke in favor of a split, saying he had consulted an architect in Simcoe on his own and received a minimum renovation cost estimate of \$74,000 for the Waterford building.

He recommended the Woodhouse building be used by the clerk and mayor, the Port Dover one by the treasurer and Jarvis by engineers.

Mr. Scott rebuked Mr. Roxburgh, also a Finance and Administration committee member. He said he was "just a tiny bit hostile" about Mr. Roxburgh taking action on his own and questioned why he did not mention his findings to the committee at their 26th meeting when he had visited Venton on the 22nd of February.

Mr. Roxburgh replied that the meeting a week ago Tuesday was not to discuss the building proposal.

Councillor Phil Hare and Bruce Meehan also agreed \$100,000 was too

much for the taxpayer to accommodate for a 2 - 3 year stop gap.

And, councillor Gordon Miller argued in favor of picking a site for the city's centre now. "I think it's obvious where the centre is—right here (Jarvis)", he pointed out. Councillor Keith Shay agreed.

The urgent need to know where the satellite city is to be located was another point brought out.

Ken Porteous sug-

gested that perhaps the matter should be reviewed further.

However, Jim Davidson argued the city can't wait. The bank and a few other things have to be settled, he said.

And, Mayor John Pow said he's got to know where he's going to be. "I'm here, there and everywhere else right now," he continued.

Council finally approved the three way split between Port Dover and Jarvis.

The Detachment of Provincial Police at Cayuga say damage totalled \$2,000.00.

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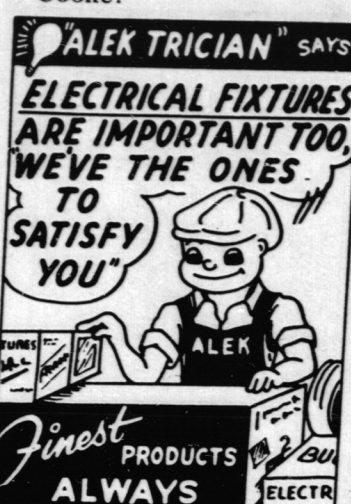
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
