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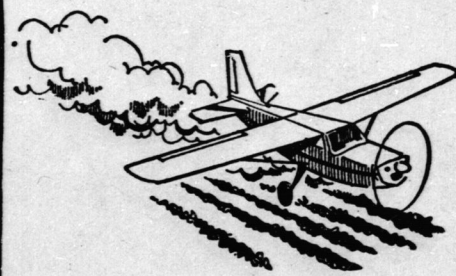
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Friends 'N Neighbors

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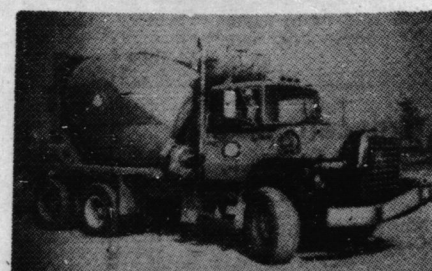
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Jarvis Lions Appeal For Easter Seals Support

Eleven - year - old Billy Lynch, Ontario's 1974 "Timmy" has Cerebral Palsy. He is handicapped. And, there are 13,000 youngsters across Ontario like him.

Between now and Easter, the Jarvis Lions Club, which is responsible for the care and treatment of crippled children in the Jarvis area, are appealing to the community for support of its work with handicapped kids.

To continue their work carried out in co-operation with the Ontario Society for Crippled Children, Jarvis Lions must raise \$1500 from the sale of Easter Seals. This is its share of the overall provincial objective of \$1,800,000 needed to provide services, medical attention and camping facilities for crippled children.

Last Wednesday (March 13) approximately 1,000 letters were mailed to area residents, including a return address envelope to the Jarvis Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, for your use.

Like other organizations and businesses, the OSCC has been hit by inflation. A \$10 donation five years ago is today worth about \$7.24 in purchasing power. So, the Lions, on behalf of the crippled children, would appreciate your generous support.

H-N Wants Water And Sewer Assistance

Haldimand - Norfolk wants in on the new Provincial Housing Action Program in order to get water and sewer assistance and, thus, cheaper housing.

Earlier this month, representatives of the Regional Planning and Development Committee met with people from the ministries of Housing, Environment and Treasury to discuss the possibility of putting housing in the urban areas of H - N in the

immediate short-term. They learned monies are available to assist municipalities in providing hard services (water and sewers) for this new housing.

However, the problem at present is that Haldimand - Norfolk is not included in the Provincial Action area. It only provides for metropolitan Ontario municipalities.

At a meeting in Cayuga last Thursday,

H - N councillors approved a motion requesting H - N be included in the Housing Program.

And to collect from all area municipalities their statistics on land available for immediate housing development and the particulars on each site.

This information will be collaborated and housing allocated to the various local and urban areas.

This program would be for short - term housing only - to accommodate the influx of workers expected when Stelco begins construction.
