

History Of Hagersville

PENTECOSTAL CHURCH

In 1933, the Pentecostal Church first organized in Hagersville, with Rev. J. H. Blair, of Central Tabernacle of Hamilton holding cottage meetings in the home of various parishioners. During the summer of 1933 the site of the present Post Office was used for the preaching of the gospel by Rev. Alfred Caustin, now a retired missionary from India. That fall, the congregation began worship in a hall located above the present Mary Jane Shop under the leadership of Rev. Emerson Thompson.

In 1935, the Church purchased the building next to IGA on King Street, where Rev. Thompson, Miss Elsie Richardson, and Rev. Raddatz ministered consecutively. Then for a four year period, the Church was privileged to have as pastor, Rev. J. H. Blair who kindly brought with him to

services the evangelists and ministers visiting at the Central Tabernacle. Rev. Charles Forrest was the next pastor. At that time the present church property, on the corner of Sherring and David Sts. was purchased.

During the ministry of Rev. Ernest Peterson, the new church was built and was opened May 11, 1947.

During the pastorage of Eldon Ford, the congregation was happy to burn the mortgage on the fine church building, and the parsonage was built. Over the next ten year period,

Rev. Ralph Buschert, Rev. George Mallory, and their families, gave richly to the church of their musical ability and teaching of the Scriptures.

For the following three years Rev. Harold House was pastor. In 1964, Rev. David McClean came to minister to the people, and during his term a new addition was completed to give needed space and facilities.

The present minister is Rev. Warriner, and he continues to bring God's blessing to the church.


