Although Easter this year came in the middle of April, Members of Parliament were unable to enjoy the normal Easter break. This came about because the Government endeavoured to force through some last minute legislation against the wishes of the Opposition. The Opposition made a counter proposal to co-operate with the Government plans in return for the guarantee of an Opposition day in the House of Commons, prior to the budget. All parties became up - tight and would not give unanimous consent for an adjournment motion for the Easter week.

Schools and Parliament Meet

During the month of April senior students from two schools visited Ottawa. At the beginning of the month Mr. R. Lang, Principal of the J.L. Mitchell School from Cayuga, escorted a group of students. Toward the end of the month Mr. David Hilton, Principal of Walsingham Elementary School, also visited Ottawa with his students. In both instances I arranged breakfast for them at the House of Commons cafeteria. Arrangements also were made to watch the proceedings in the House of Commons. During the day I addressed the students from Cayuga, while Mr. Jake Epp, an M.P. from Manitoba, spoke to the Walsingham group. As a memento of their visit, Canada Flag pins were passed out to each student.

In the case of the Waterford District High School, Parliament came to Waterford. The staff and students held their third annual Model Parliament. I was invited to be present and I brought with me the Hon. Marcel Lambert, a former Speaker of the House of Commons. Mr. Lambert acted as Speaker for the Model Parliament in the school auditorium. In the evening he addressed the students and their guests at a banquet. To have a former Speaker was a real thrill for the students. It made their

Model Parliament almost a reality.

National Prayer Breakfast

The tenth Annual National Prayer Breakfast was held in the Confederation Room of the West Block on April 10th, 1974. The Breakfast was hosted by Commons' Speaker, the Honourable Lucien Lamoureux, and Senate Speaker, the Honourable Muriel Fergusson. The Guest Speaker was Mr. Jean Beliveau, Vice - President of Le Club de Hockey Canadiens. Members of the Cabinet and Leaders of all Political Parties were represented. More than thirty - eight countries were represented by their Ambassadors. The Annual Breakfast is organized by the Parliamentary Prayer group, which meets each Wednesday morning on Parliament Hill throughout the Session. The response was overwhelming again this year.

One of the major social events of the year was held by the Speaker of the House of Commons in the Hall of Honour in the Parliament Buildings on Wednesday, April 24th. You will recall it was the Ambassador who opened the Belgian Fair last summer in Langton.

Legislation Passed During the Month.

The major items of legislation which became law during April were the following: Bill C - 5, an act which authorizes the expenditure of public money to help in financing the C.N.R. and Air Canada. Before the passage of this bill there was a lively debate on the quality of service provided by these two transportation agencies. Bill C 14, an act to amend the Farm Improvement Loans Act, the Small Business Loans Act and the Fisheries Improvement Loans Act. Bill C - 27, an act to facilitate the relocation of railway lines or rerouting of railway tracks in urban areas.

The Football Bill

Perhaps no piece of legislation has been more widely discussed than the so - called Football Bill, C - 22. This is the first time that the Canadian Government has interfered in professional sport of any kind. One wonders where it might end. What about the National Hockey League? The Montreal Expos? The sad part of it all is that most thinking people feel the bill will not accomplish the object-

ives claimed for it by its supporters. The World Football League will become a reality whether a team is in Toronto or not. It will have a far reaching effect on all C.F.L. football teams.

Government on Strike?

There must have been times during the past two weeks when the people of Canada had reached the conclusion that the governmental process at the Ottawa level had come to a full halt. Strikes were breaking out in all directions and the Trudeau Government seemed powerless to act. In the midst of it all the Prime Minister took off for the Barbados for an Easter holiday, which led one pundit to remark, "the government is going from calypso to calypso".

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O.P.P. Report

This week of May 12 to May 18 inclusive is Police Week. The Ontario Provincial Police of Cayuga Detachment welcome the public to come and visit the Detachment and see the various types of equipment we have and answer as many questions that may be asked.

Two break ins were investigated at cottages at Sandy Bay on April 28, 1974. Damage amounting to \$460.00 occurred at one cottage and a portable water pump valued at \$150.00 was stolen from the other cottage.

A car stolen from Caledonia on May 2, 1974 was found in a bush between 4th and 5th Line, Oneida Township, partially stripped and burned. While investigating the above occurrence, another vehicle stolen from Caledonia in September 1973 was also found totally stripped and burned in a bush nearby.

On April 30, 1974, Const. R. The child was taken to Henderson General Hospital, Hamilton, where he was hospitalized with a fractured femur.
