should be parallel to larger urban areas.

If we do it now, he said, it will save further erosion of the merchants' position. When larger chains come to the area with the growth of the satellite city, they will force us to change.

He told the businessmen Canadian Tire is planning to build a large store on Highway 3 outside of Simcoe, which will have a competitive effect on Hagersville.

Clayton Heaslip said Thursday night openings would be great for him. It was hardly worth the effort and cost of hydro to stay open Wednesday, he said.

He explained that as the popularity of computer paying grows, the merchants will find more people receiving their pay on Thursdays.

Wednesday nights aren't busy, so Thursday is a worthy try, Doris Brooks said.

Richard Laurie and Ken Vokes both questioned whether the businesses will earn enough revenue to justify remaining open Thursday night.

"I tend to think one night is enough", Mr. Laurie said. "I agree," Mr. Vokes added, "I don't think the town can afford it."

Don Brown concurred Wednesday nights aren't busy, but said he would hate to see the town break the Wednesday night tradition without discussion on how it will affect employees working two nights in a row, adding nine hours for some merchants who close now on Thursday afternoons and whether it will be beneficial to the merchants.

The merchants agreed their uniform store hours should be well advertised. They have received no word yet on the availability of railway lands for parking.

However, the immed-

iate need for parking was stressed once again.

Many people leave their cars in Hagersville to join a car pool travelling to Hamilton or Nanticoke, while others take excursion trips from the village.

This results in a lack of parking for shoppers.

Area councillor Pat Mackereth reported she had relayed the need for a bylaw enforcement officer in Hagersville to the Town of Haldimand.

However, Mac McKellar feels the town can't enforce it until they can provide off street parking.

Mrs. Storgaard stressed the urgency of the situation, telling merchants Simpson Development is also getting ready to go in on Highway 3, outside of Simcoe. If the merchants don't get people into town before a move such as this, they're not going to get any after, she pointed out.

The merchants have expressed opposition to meters, but would like

to see their two hour limit enforced.
