Seed treatment of corn will be more important this year if the weather continues to be cool and moist. Germination of corn seeds will be slow, resulting in more opportunities for seed and seedling rots, wireworms, and seed maggots to attack the seed and seedling corn plant.

The majority of seed corn is treated with a fungicide to help prevent seed and seedling rot. Most growers treat the seed with D and L (diazinon - lindane) to reduce the incidence of damage by wireworms and seed maggots. This simple job of seed treating is very important to getting a good stand of corn, if it doesn't get out of the ground, there won't be a corn crop this fall.

## Obituaries

BECKERSON, Cecil V. "Cec", as he was commonly called by his friends, was born on May 26, 1894 in Walsingham.

At an early age he moved to Walpole Township with his father, Richard Beckerson, his mother Jane Overbaugh, two brothers and one sister. In 1916 Cec joined the 14th Battalion "Brook's Rangers". Upon arrival in England he was transferred to the 1st Motor Machine Gun Brigade. He saw service in France, where he was awarded the King George V Military Medal for bravery in the field, beyond the call of duty.

On September 23, 1920 he married Harriet Risdill of Garnet. Cec is mourned by his wife, three daughters, Helen, Myrtle and Shirley, four granddaughters and his sister, Mrs. Nellie Stallwood.

In September, 1939 Cec again voluntarily answered his country's call and joined the Ontario Tank Corps Regiment. He spent five years in London, England where his rank was that of Sergeant Major.

Upon his discharge he accepted the position as Custodian of the Haldimand Rural Youth Centre at Kohler, Ont. There he made many friends and worked happily for Mr. A. Gordon Skinner for nearly twenty years.

Upon his retirement in 1964, Cec and his wife took up residence in Jarvis, Ontario where they lived until his passing on May 2, 1974 at the West Haldimand General Hospital.

He was a faithful member of Wesley United Church and a member of Erie Orange Lodge for over fifty years.

Cec loved people and his motto was to help anyone whom he could.

The funeral service was held on May 5, 1974 at the Hyde and Mott Funeral Home, Rev. G. Taylor - Munro officiating. Interment followed in Hagersville Cemetery.

## Nanticoke To Advertise For Jarvis Guard

City of Nanticoke councillors agreed to advertise for school crossing guards for the village of Jarvis and town of Port Dover at a meeting in Dover on Tuesday, May 7th.

The recommendation was brought forward by the Protective Services Committee.

Also at council:

\* Kenneth Campbell, former recreation director for Waterford-Townsend was hired as the City of Nanticoke Recreation Director at an annual salary of \$12,500 plus mileage at the rate of 15 cents.

\* The City will purchase

the part of the north half of Lot 24 in Walpole Township belonging to the Selkirk I.O.O.F. for the price of \$1,250 pending the completion of a survey.

\* Due to the increasing demand for accommodation by commercial and fishing vessels in the East Basin in Port Dover and the urgent need being thereby created for an expansion of the East Basin in order to accommodate the additional vessels, Nanticoke will petition the Department of the Environment Small Harbours Branch of the Canadian Government to

give consideration to the implementation of immediate expansion of the Port Dover Harbour facilities. A copy of the resolution will be forwarded to the Planning and Development Committee of the Regional Council of Haldimand - Norfolk and Bill Knowles.

Mayor John Pow of Nanticoke will not be able to attend regional council meetings from four to six weeks for health reasons, H - N councillors were told last week.

Jack Maythem of Port Dover - Woodhouse will be sitting in his place during the interim period. Councillor Gordon Miller said Mr. Pow had his eye operation Monday (May 6) and his report was quite favorable.
