Nanticoke Council To Pay \$4 Bounty On Foxes

The City of Nanticoke will pay a \$4 bounty on all foxes of any age or sex as a precaution against the spread of rabies.

At a council meeting in Port Dover Tuesday, councillors agreed the bounty established by former Haldimand and Norfolk counties should be continued.

Deputy - mayor Gordon Miller explained the region will be picking up the tab until June.

Ward 3 councillor Ken Porteous supported the motion whole - heartedly

and described the ordeal his two young children had to go through when they took rabies shots.

"I don't see any reason why our fox population can't be trimmed down considerably", he said.

Foxes are one of the main causes of the spread of rabies, he continued, and they can carry this virus for miles and contaminate other animals.

Ward 1 councillor Bruce Meehan questioned how the bounty would be administered.

Finance and Administration Chairman Harry Scott explained the foxes can be taken to any member of council who will mutilate the animal in some way that will prevent persons from claiming on it again and issue a certificate to bring to the municipal office for payment.

At a meeting of the Town of Haldimand council a week ago Monday, it was agreed to carry on with the bounty in that municipality also.

Royal Bank Of Canada Wants To Lease Building Near Jarvis

The Royal Bank of Canada wants to erect a new building at the corner of Highway 3 and the Nanticoke sideroad for servicing the Texaco and Stelco industrial complex.

At a City of Nanticoke council meeting Tuesday, councillors read a letter from Andrew Williamson of Doughty and Williamson Ltd., R.R. 1, Jarvis saying Stelco and Texaco "have

indicated that it is their wish that a bank be located in this vicinity by October of this year".

Doughty and Williamson were approached by the Royal requesting them to erect and lease a building on 12.08 acres of their land at the southeast corner of Lot 6, Con. 8, Walpole. This site is just east of Jarvis.

In turn, they are

requesting permission from the region and support from Nanticoke to have this land rezoned from "agriculture" to "local commercial".

Doughty and Williamson have reached a tentative agreement with the Royal - providing regional and provincial permits can be obtained.

Nanticoke council turned the matter over to their planning advisory committee for a recommendation.

Council Protests Hockey Violence

City of Nanticoke councillors endorsed a resolution supporting an inquiry into violence in hockey at their meeting in Port Dover Tuesday.

"Too much emphasis is placed on slaughter on the ice", Ward 3 councillor Harry Scott said. "I see no reason why hockey isn't and shouldn't be a hard aggressive game," he

maintained, but players are not supposed to be out there to injure people. "I'm very concerned about what's happening to minor hockey....."

Seven other council-

lors agreed with him and approved a Regional Municipality of Peel resolution which was triggered by the O.H.A. Junior B final first game between the Bramalea Blues and
