## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I have heard it suggested that Canadians aren't interested in, nor do they want, an election at this time. It seems to me that there is plenty of reason to want a change, if one looks at the current state of affairs.

Inflation, last year, ran at a rate of more than nine percent and there is every indication that the rate will be higher this year. During last year, organized workers received increases of only eight percent while unorganized workers fared even more poorly. The result is that the "purchasing power" of the vast majority has actually decreased.

On the other hand, much of the business world had record profits in 1973. The first quarter of 1974 profit reports are very enlightening. Imperial Oil announced profits of 94 million, up 100 percent over the same period last year. Much of the milling industry reports profits up around 20 percent. The food industry reports profits up in the area of 60 to 75 percent.

Reports state that the forest industry can cite instances of profits up in excess of 700 percent. At the same time, many small businesses and farmers are really feeling the "pinch".

The results are the disturbing part. Less of the Gross National Product is ending up in wages and an increasing amount is ending up in corporation profits. It will be argued that Canadians receive those profits but the 5% of the wealthiest Canadians own the vast majority of the stocks so the gain to others

is infinitesimal. When one adds to this, the fact that a higher percent of government revenue is coming from personal income tax and that a lower percentage is coming from taxes on corporation profits, you begin to wonder if there is any justice in the economic sphere.

Everyone wants to see Canada have a wealthy business sector in its economy. Only healthy businesses can pay adequate wages, provide long term job security and pay reasonable returns to their investors. When prices are raised to the highest level the traffic will bear and when prices bear little resemblance to the cost of production, there had better be some government willing to say, "that's enough". Just as you are expected to treat others ethically and it is enforced by law, so corporations should treat us ethically and there should be laws which are enacted and used to enforce their ethical conduct.

I am so concerned about what is happening that I am going to seek the nomination of the New Democratic Party in Haldimand-Norfolk. I see no other party which is willing to represent the vast majority of people who are not wealthy. A just system would have all people contribute to the needs of the country according to their ability to pay.

I would like to see all voters forget how they, or their fathers or grandfathers voted. I would like them to delve to find the philosophy which most nearly matches their own philosophy. If

this could happen, we would have the most enlightened voters in the nation. If people get the kind of government they deserve, we then would deserve nothing but the best.
