direct responsibility for water and sewers.

But Mr. Coates does become involved to a certain extent as it pertains to subdivisions in Nanticoke.

"We set the standards for those services," he said.

Giving an example, Mr. Coates explained there is a subdivision in its first stage which has open ditches.

For its second stage there will be curb and gutter and a storm drain system, he said.

This is in keeping with accepted subdivision standards.

The Engineering
Department will also
inspect the installation
of subdivision services,
usually by hiring a con-
sulting engineer to do
this for them.

"I expect in time we
may have our own inspec-
tion staff in the Public
Works Department,"
Engineer Coates com-
mented. But this will
depend on the volume
of subdivisions to be
developed.

He has some input to
the regional planning
department (region has
ultimate say) and acts by
times as an advisor to
Nanticoke's Planning
Advisory Committee.
Committee members
sometimes seek guid-
ance on whether a
severance could disrupt

drainage or other nat-
ural features, Mr.
Coates said.

Of course, with the
Lake Erie Industrial
Development being car-
ried out in the mun-
icipality, the Engineer-
ing Department is
involved a great deal
with Stelco and Texaco
on matters concerning
new road construction
and discussions as to
what will happen in the
future.

Mr. Coates has had
a reasonably easy time
in this respect because
he was familiar with
the background from
dealing with the indus-
tries at the county level.

Nanticoke road crews
do rural road construc-
tion; not industrial.

Major Projects

Some of the major
projects the Public
Works Department has
undertaken since April
1st include:

Reconstructed sev-
eral miles in Townsend,
one mile in Woodhouse
and have started on
one mile in Walpole.
Carried out a fairly
extensive hard top
maintenance program.
Resurfaced approx-
imately 45 miles of hard
surface roads.

Industrial (actual
work carried out by
private contractors) -
The complete recon-
struction of the third
concession of Walpole
between the Nanticoke
Sideroad and Sandusky
Road. Partial con-
struction of concession
Two east from the Nan-
ticoke Sideroad.

Contract for paving
north - south Stelco axis
road.

Completion of River-
side Drive (former
Chamber's Road).

Garbage Collection
After November 18th,
Nanticoke will have a
new across the city pol-
icy on garbage pick-
up.

Everybody will have
collection of household
garbage and refuse, Mr.
Coates explained. And
it will be handled by
private contractors,
rather than municipal
employees.

Prior to April 1st,
Townsend, Waterford
and Woodhouse had con-
tract garbage collec-
tion, Port Dover and
Jarvis had public works
employees doing it and
Walpole had no collec-
tion.

(3.09, 13%), Cayuga -
30.39 (3.73, 14%), North
Cayuga - 87.07 (3.03,
4%), South Cayuga -
115.89 (5.47, 5%), Hag-
ersville - 24.05 (2.91,
14%), Oneida - 94.03
(8.74, 10%), Rainham -
76.48 (11.08, 17%), Sen-
eca - 94.65 (3.87, 4%),
Walpole - 76.68 (126).

In Hagersville the
east section will pay an
additional 2 mills and
the west section will
pay 7.950 extra mills
for water and sewers.

Fisherville residents
and those living in the
Garbage Area of Sen-
eca will be required to
pay 2.921 and 3.921 more
mills respectively.

For those paying sep-
arate school residen-
tial rates in Haldimand,
they are as follows:
Caledonia - 27.85 (3.49,
14%), Cayuga - 30.83
(3.86%, 4%), North Cay-
uga - 88.34 (3.81, 4%),
South Cayuga, nil; Hag-
ersville - 24.59 (3.22,
15%), Oneida - 95.53
(9.76, 21%), Rainham -
78.89 (13.49, 21%), Sen-
eca - 96.24 (4.98, 5%),
Walpole - 77.34 (1.03%).

While councillor
Blake Gloyd felt the
figure was a little too
high. "In our munici-
pality alone we've had as
many as five in one
year," he said. This
could prove to be expen-
sive.

"I think it's worth it
if you get that many
championships in a
year," Mayor Dave
Peirson replied.

Also at council:

The Hagersville

Household Wastes "Fall Clean Up"

Former Township Of Townsend

Collection of other than household garbage (fall
clean-up) will be carried out in the Former Township of
Townsend on NOVEMBER 13TH, 14TH and 15TH, 1974.
This collection will be made on the regularly scheduled
days for pick-up of household garbage, and residents should
put this refuse out for collection on those days.

Residents should note that this pick-up excludes items
such as farm fence, demolished buildings or parts of
buildings, the whole or parts of either automobiles or
autobodies or trucks, trees or tree stumps, or concrete
chunks or boulders. Acceptable items include household
rubbish, garden refuse, kitchen appliances, furniture.

CITY OF NANTICOKE GARBAGE COLLECTION

Former Town Of Port Dover

Cookson Construction Limited has been awarded a
contract for garbage collection within the limits of the
former Town of Port Dover. This contract is for the
collection of household garbage only. The City of
Nanticoke Public Works Department employees will no
longer be used for the collection of household garbage. As
in the past, commercial garbage and refuse normally picked
up by Public Works Department employees will continue to
be picked up by the City forces. A new By-law to exclude
commercial pick-up of any kind is being prepared.
Businesses so affected will be notified as to when pick-up
will be discontinued. Household pick-up in Port Dover will
be as follows -

Mondays

The "south" section of Port Dover extending from the
boundary streets as outlined below to the Lake Erie shore:
Nelson Street (Radical Road)
To First Avenue, and southeast along First Avenue
To Grace Street and northeast along Grace Street
To Market Street and northeast along Market Street
To St. George Street and southeast along St. George Street
To Clinton Street and northeast along Clinton Street
To St. Andrews Street and southeast along St. Andrews
Street

To Highway No. 6 and east along Highway No. 6 to the
Lynn River
North following the course of the Lynn River and northeast
following Black Creek

Residents on both sides of the above-described boundary
streets will have garbage collection on Monday's.

Tuesdays

The "north" section of Port Dover comprising the balance
of the Town north of the boundary streets indicated above.

Commercial Pick-up

Commercial Pick-up by City crews will be on Tuesdays
only. Garbage should be set out for collection no later than
8 a.m.

NOTE - Residents should place garbage out at the curb
no later than 7 a.m. the day of collection or no earlier than
7 p.m. the evening prior to collection.

Household Garbage and Refuse is defined as: -
- waste and refuse from the household preparation of
food including glass and metal containers, paper and plastic
food containers and wrappings

- discarded newspapers, metal and plastic containers,
wearing apparel, household linen, packaging from
household items other than food and waste, excluding large
appliance packaging, generated by the normal operation of
a household

Garbage shall be set out in containers or plastic bags
securely bound.

The weight of said containers, bags or otherwise shall
not exceed forty (40) pounds.

Residents should place garbage in front of their
residences adjacent to the travelled portion of the street.
