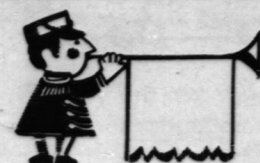


Hagersville Highlights

1. Know what benefits OHIP provides before you leave home.
2. If you consider that your OHIP coverage may be insufficient, you can obtain supplementary coverage from private insurers for out of province charges.
3. Always carry your OHIP card with you.
4. In a financial emergency, ask the hospital to phone or write OHIP to confirm your coverage.

Remember, you will usually have to make payment on the spot for treatment outside Ontario. But OHIP will reimburse you for insured services if you submit itemized receipts within 6 months of the date of service.

Describe why you were outside of Ontario - vacation, business, etc. - and provide complete personal information plus details of the medical or hospital service performed. Include name and address of physician, hospital, fee for each service and dates. And always state your OHIP number.

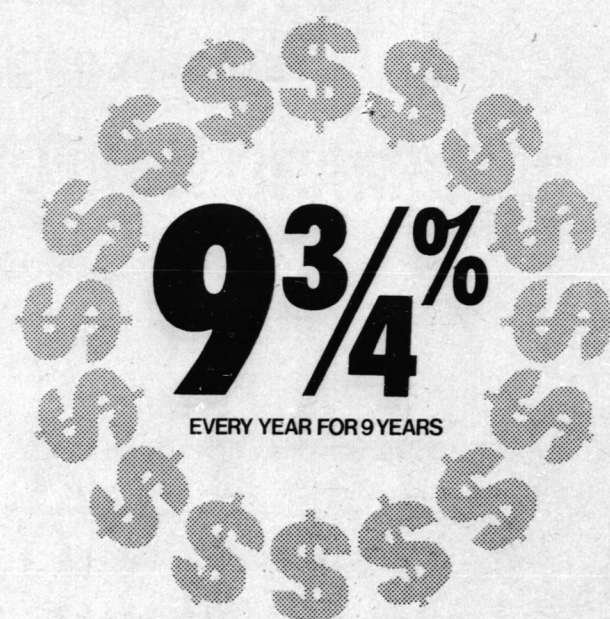
