Elections In Many Areas

Voters in some regions of Haldimand and Nanticoke may not have to go to the polls December 2 to elect trustees to the Haldimand Board of Education and the Haldimand - Norfolk Roman Catholic Sep-

arate School Board. The Record polled each clerk's office early Tuesday afternoon and learned some wards did not yet have any nominations while others already indicated an election.

Since nominations did not close until 5 p.m. Tuesday (past our deadline) additional nominations or withdrawals may have been made. These will be reported in next week's issue.

For the Haldimand Board of Education in the Town of Haldimand, the following nominations were listed according to the clerk's office:

Caledonia (one to be elected) - Bryce N. Taylor of Cayuga. He is proprietor of Taylor Hardware.

Incumbent Eugene Baird of Cayuga is a plumbing inspector.

Some Satellite

Tenants Unhappy

Some tenants living on land slated for Nanticoke's future satellite city site are upset with their landlord - The Province of Ontario.

Queen's Park purchased approximately 11,000 acres in Walpole Township for the housing of people drawn to the area by the Nanticoke Industrial Development.

Since all the land is not needed immediately, portions are being rented back to former owners with the tenants' responsibility for paying taxes as part of the agreement.

At a meeting of City of Nanticoke Council in Port Dover Tuesday, councillor Keith Shay reported the province, who is sent the tax bills, is not returning them quickly enough to the tenants.

All those who pay their taxes late are subject to a one percent per month penalty.

Councillors Harry Scott and Bruce Meehan both said they've received similar complaints.

It was suggested at the meeting the province should be responsible

Nanticoke Objects To Stelco Tax Suggestion

Stelco's "interference" on the question of equalized assessment for the Haldimand-Norfolk Region raised the ire of Nanticoke councillors.

At a meeting in Port Dover Tuesday, city representatives made it clear they will object to any bid to change the Tax and Assessment structure in the region in relation to Industrial Assessment.

Eric Hardy, a consultant working for Stelco, attended a H-N Regional Council meeting in Cayuga three weeks ago. He proposed the approval of permissive legislation which

would allow the Region to address themselves to the problem of spreading the wealth.

At the Nanticoke meeting this week, councillor Jack Maythem urged council to take a strong stand.

Concerned already that more and more local power is being usurped by the region and province, Mr. Maythem said now Nanticoke has a company (Stelco) coming in who feels they are so big they want to make political decisions.

He pointed out the area will be paying larger and

larger amounts to the region as their assessment grows and they will have greater expenses.

He added Stelco's recommendation that some of the company's assessment should be spread

throughout the region would be acceptable to every other representative except those in Nanticoke.

Councillor George Dmetriuc took exception to "Stelco's bid to buy favors."

If a change in assessment is required it should come

Stelco Says

Most Workers Commute

Most of the 200 workers employed at Stelco's Lake Erie site are commuting. And, primarily they are travelling from Hamilton, Ron Tipler, Public Relations officer for the Steel Company of Canada, told reporters in Port Dover Friday.

Some purchases have been made of homes on the periphery of the Haldimand-Norfolk Region, such as Caledonia, where housing is found to be cheaper, he said. But there are not a great number

moving into the immediate area.

"Many I'm sure will attempt to commute for a long time," he said.

The company expects there will be 500 people employed in Nanticoke by the end of this year.

At one time there was some discussion and an application made for the setting up of a trailer camp on the project site. But this idea has been deleted from company plans.

"We hope to avoid it,"

Ross Robertson, liaison officer, said.

There will be an ongoing need for construction workers right into the next century, he explained. Employees will probably want to bring their families and settle.

The company is working hand in hand with the Ministry of Housing and Regional Government to establish permanent, rather than temporary housing, Mr. Tipler added.
