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from regional council, he said. He didn't know whether the move was a "publicity stunt" or buying favors but

he said he hoped it was neither. "I hope it was done in good faith," he said. Councillor Harry Scott felt the company was giving

all appearances of good corporate citizens until "Mr. Hardy stood up." He reminded councillors Stelco earlier gave Nanticoke the same presentation on the Industrial Park site they later gave the region ... minus the equalized assessment suggestion.

If Mr. Hardy did not speak on his own initiative to the Region, Mr. Scott said he would charge the Steel Company of Canada with being "devious and sidestepping their duties to the ratepayers of Nanticoke ..."

He also objected to Mr. Hardy talking to James Allan, MPP for H-N on the matter.

"This is highly undemocratic," he said. Councillor Gordon Miller felt only time will tell how great advantage the industrial park will be to Nanticoke.

In the future there may be a need for adjustment if the figures prove it. But looking at tax bills, he said it hasn't been proven at this time.

Mayor John Pow further explained Nanticoke has six subdivisions underway that

will be supplying homes for the worker.

Stelco will be informed of Nanticoke's objections. And a Public Works recommendation favored "immediate action be taken to advise our Provincial Government representatives of the feelings of the City of Nanticoke ... and that a brief be prepared presenting our position in regard to the proposal made to Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Council on October 24 by representatives of Stelco."

Former Township of Walpole
North of and including Highway 3

Residents in the former Township of Walpole - north of and including Highway 3 are advised that a garbage collection contract for that area has been awarded to Mr. Bill Cookson. Mr. Cookson will commence pick-up of the area bounded by Highway 3 and Concession 10 on Wednesday, November 27th, 1974. The balance of the area north of Concession 10 will have Thursday pick-up starting November 28th, 1974.

This contract is for the collection of household garbage and refuse only. This material is defined as waste and refuse from the household preparation of food including glass and metal containers, paper and plastic food containers and wrappings, discarded newspapers, metal and plastic containers, wearing apparel, household linen, packaging from household items other than food and waste excluding large appliance packaging, generated by the normal operation of a household.

Garbage should be set out in containers or plastic bags securely bound.

Weight of said containers, bags or otherwise should not exceed forty (40) pounds.

Residents should place garbage along the shoulder of the travelled portion of the road.

Refuse should be placed out for collection no later than 7 a.m. the day of collection or 7 p.m. the evening prior to the day of collection.

CITY OF NANTICOKE GARBAGE COLLECTION

Former Town Of Port Dover

Cookson Construction Limited has been awarded a contract for garbage collection within the limits of the former Town of Port Dover. This contract is for the collection of household garbage only. The City of Nanticoke Public Works Department employees will no longer be used for the collection of household garbage. As in the past, commercial garbage and refuse normally picked up by Public Works Department employees will continue to be picked up by the City forces. A new By-law to exclude commercial pick-up of any kind is being prepared. Businesses so affected will be notified as to when pick-up will be discontinued. Household pick-up in Port Dover will be as follows -

Mondays
The "south" section of Port Dover extending from the boundary streets as outlined below to the Lake Erie shore: Nelson Street (Radical Road)

To First Avenue, and southeast along First Avenue to Grace Street and northeast along Grace Street to Market Street and northeast along Market Street to St. George Street and southeast along St. George Street to Clinton Street and northeast along Clinton Street to St. Andrews Street and southeast along St. Andrews Street

To Highway No. 6 and east along Highway No. 6 to the Lynn River

North following the course of the Lynn River and northeast following Black Creek

Residents on both sides of the above-described boundary streets will have garbage collection on Monday's.

Tuesdays
The "north" section of Port Dover comprising the balance of the Town north of the boundary streets indicated above.

Commercial Pick-up

Commercial Pick-up by City crews will be on Tuesdays only. Garbage should be set out for collection no later than 8 a.m.

NOTE - Residents should place garbage out at the curb no later than 7 a.m. the day of collection or no earlier than 7 p.m. the evening prior to collection.

Household Garbage and Refuse is defined as: -
- waste and refuse from the household preparation of food including glass and metal containers, paper and plastic food containers and wrappings

- discarded newspapers, metal and plastic containers, wearing apparel, household linen, packaging from household items other than food and waste, excluding large appliance packaging, generated by the normal operation of a household

Garbage shall be set out in containers or plastic bags securely bound.

The weight of said containers, bags or otherwise shall not exceed forty (40) pounds.

Residents should place garbage in front of their residences adjacent to the travelled portion of the street.
