Election In Hagersville

D. Duxbury And R. Steele Acclaimed In Jarvis - Walpole

There will be six local elections for trustees to the Haldimand Board of Education on December 2.

Voters will be travelling to the polls in Hagersville, Caledonia, Oneida, Dunnville and Dunn - Canboro to elect a representative. The separate school seat will also require a vote.

In all other areas under the Haldimand jurisdiction, candidates were acclaimed.

Don Duxbury of R.R. 1, Jarvis and Russell Steele of R.R. 1, Selkirk became Jarvis - Walpole's two members after Norman Sinibaldi withdrew his nomination last Wednesday.

Mr. Duxbury is a local dairy farmer while Mr. Steele works for the provincial government as a dairy herd fieldman.

Mr. Duxbury, present chairman of the Haldimand Board, has served the

education system as a trustee for over 20 years. And he has been with the Haldimand Board since its inception.

The father of four children ranging in age from 16 to 23, Mr. Duxbury told the Record he plans to make a special address to the Board at their December meeting regarding a new look and direction for the future.

Mr. Steele, father of three children, 14, 21 and 23 years old, said he felt it was time he took an interest in education. He said he is satisfied with the present system and just wants to help make it work.

A Selkirk Volunteer fireman and member of the Selkirk Centennial Hall Board, Mr. Steele is a grade 13 graduate with 12 years bookkeeping experience.

In Hagersville Mel Henderson and incumbent

Jennifer Eustace will be vying for a seat on the Board.

Mr. Henderson, owner of Henderson Motors in the village, said he is running because he's interested in the education his children will be receiving and education in general.

He is 44 and the father of three children aged 10, 14 and 17.

Mrs. Eustace, a housewife and fourth year political and social work student at McMaster University is seeking her second term on the Board.

Two main issues she would like the new Board to look into are the present policy on the use of schools and more public involvement in the education process.

The school use policy was established 1½ years

"Eyeball To Eyeball"

H-N Wants Talk With White

H-N regional councillors want to talk to John White, Minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs, "eyeball to eyeball" on the development of the new Town.

The proposed satellite city is slated for 11,000 acres just west of Jarvis.

After prodding by Regional Chairman John McCombs and senior staff members, Mr. McCombs says the minister is ready to move quickly on the development of the new Town.

He sent letters to regional councillors November 9th outlining the four proposals suggested by Mr. White, indicating his own choice and asking any councillors who object to it to contact him or the regional administrator that

weekend or by Tuesday, November 12.

However all regional councillors felt the importance of developing the new city properly necessitates some dialogue between councillors and Mr. White.

There's a good many points I'd like to discuss with him "eyeball to eyeball", Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd commented.

Regional councillors approved a motion to have the minister meet with them.

Basically, the development of the new Town will be carried out by a Subsidiary Land Corporation whose parent body will be the Ontario Land Corporation.

How the relationship of this Subsidiary Ontario Land Corporation is

established with Regional Council is the basic problem in writing the legislation outlining the responsibilities of the Subsidiary Corporation.

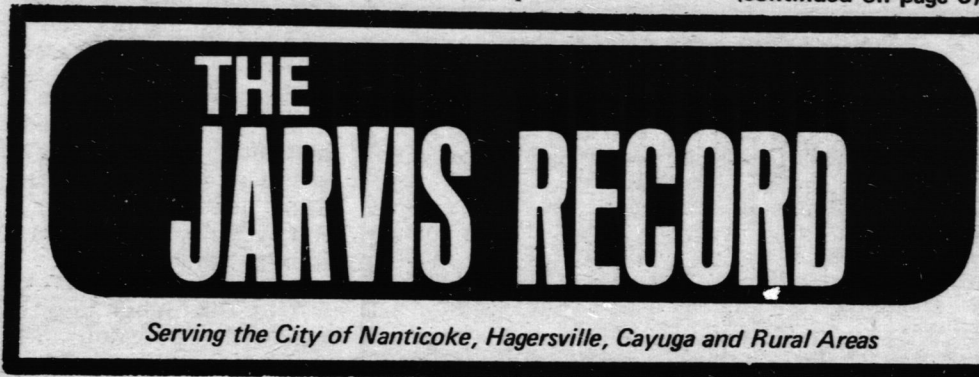
The four alternatives proposed to Mr. McCombs were:

(1) "A Subsidiary Corporation which will plan and develop the Town within the guidelines of the Ontario Planning and Development Act. This would entail the appointment of two separate advisory committees (one municipal - one citizen) and meet all the requirements and complicated time limits of the Act."

Mr. McCombs personally rejected this route.

Ribbon Cutting At Taquanyah

The Grand River Conservation Authority will officially open its new \$100,000 Taquanyah Nature Centre tomorrow (Friday, Nov. 22).

Don Duxbury, chairman of the Haldimand Board of Education, Ken Best, Ministry of Agriculture representative in Cayuga and James Bower, chairman of the Conservation Authority, will cut the ribbon at 2 p.m.

The Centre, located on the Decewsville Road near Cayuga, is the first complex to be designed and constructed by authority personnel.

It provides classroom and laboratory facilities for about 100 classes of the Haldimand Board of Education.

There will be tours and Open House till 8 p.m. Taquanyah staff would

like to acquaint the community with the facilities since it is open to other than classroom studies.

Nature clubs or other organizations as well as the general public interested in learning more about nature are also welcome there.

Cost \$30,000 More

An extra thirty thousand dollars is needed for the proposed new Dunnville Police Building.

At a meeting of Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Council last Thursday, Finance Committee chairman Fred Peacock told upper tier representatives the budget allocation for the facility needs to be adjusted to \$105,063 from \$75,000. It is to be budgeted for in 1975.

He explained the increased cost is due to the location of the lot below the flood plain level and

special cell doors. Originally, the H-N Police Commission had planned to use the doors from the old building.

Councillor Clare Huffman, a member of the Commission, added the architect's fees had never been considered.

He said the \$75,000 estimate was submitted prior to hiring an architect.

When the tenders and architect indicated a \$105,000 figure, "everyone was most shocked," he said.

Simcoe councillor Catherine Smale said she

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
