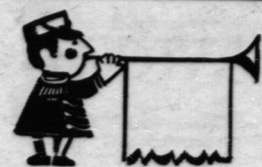


Hagersville Highlights

H - N Police Report

Of the following statistics, not one is in connection with Halloween pranks or damage. Our appreciation to a co-operative public for a safe and quiet Halloween!

There were, in all, 240 calls to which the officers responded during October, the majority of them being general complaints. Sixteen were auto accidents, with two persons being injured. Three automobiles and two bicycles were reported stolen.

Charges under the Criminal Code numbered 47, under the Highway Traffic Act 85 and under the Liquor Control Act 25. Three persons were charged under other federal and provincial statutes.

The officers of this division made 12 arrests for other departments, assisted them on 10 occasions, and

served 23 summonses. They responded to nine requests for property surveillance and six for escort duty. Their nightly checks of business premises found seven of these to be insecure.

With the colder weather putting "jack-frost" to work, early in the mornings and late at night, motorists are reminded of the law requiring the windshield and windows on either side of the compartment containing the steering wheel to be clean so as to afford the driver a clear view to the front and side of the motor vehicle. Hagersville Remembers

Parade Marshall, Comrade Omar Phillips was in charge of parade duties, when more than 349,000 Canadian casualties of three wars in this century were remembered in Hagersville on Sunday, November 9.

The colourful parade comprised of several Legion Branches, along with the local Branch 164 and Auxiliary, marched together with the local Scouts and Cubs, Girl Guides and Browns, Knights of Columbus and members of the Hagersville Ministerial Association.

Music was supplied by the Western Ontario All Star Band, as well as

the colourful Scottish Band of the Royal Canadian Legion, Dundas branch 461 of Brantford. Chaplain of the Legion, Branch 164, Rev. Adam Thomson paid tribute to the fallen comrades at the Legion Memorial Room prior to the departure of the parade. He closed with, "At the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will Remember Them." Comrade Dave Ince placed the wreath at the Memorial Room setting.

At the cenotaph the call to Worship and the Prayer of Invocation was presented by Rev. A. Thomson. Recent member of the Hagers-

ville Ministerial, Rev. John Tobey, United Church, read the Scripture Lesson, followed by Rev. Don Eustace, of the Anglican Church leading in prayer. Rev. George Ely of the local Baptist Church delivered an inspiring and appropriate message.

He presented facts to those present and stated "War is a reflection of the faults of our present everyday society, and therefore people should return to the knowledge of God our Father."

Wreaths were also placed at the base of the Cenotaph by members of the Cubs, Rangers, Guides and Brownies. The Last Post and Reveille were played by Mr. Andy Sabola, with one minute of silence in tribute being observed.
