

Commencement At Hagersville Secondary School

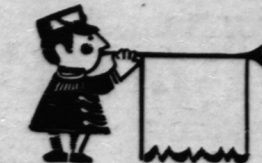

Amblyopia or Lazy Eye is a condition where one of the two eyes have poor vision, although examination shows no disease in or any malformation of that eye. If this is not detected before the child reaches the age of six to seven,

it is generally too late. Haldimand Hires Bylaw Officer

The Town of Haldimand has hired a bylaw enforcement officer to serve all its wards - Hagersville, Caledonia, Cayuga, Oneida, Seneca N. and S. Cayuga and Rainham.

Nelson Otterman of Fisherville will begin his duties January 2, 1975 and receive an annual salary of \$9,000. At a meeting in Cayuga Monday night, councillors learned Mr. Otterman will be responsible for updating and enforcing by-laws.

It was suggested this position may turn part-time once the public has been trained to follow the bylaws the proper way.

Also at council: * Mayor Dave Peirson's six brothers and father presented him with a gavel set in recognition of being the first mayor of the new Town of Haldimand. * Roy Hedley will represent Haldimand on the Niagara Regional Conservation Authority. Bill Courtage will

serve on the Long Point Conservation Authority and Ron Clark on the Grand River Conservation Authority.

No public roads presently in an unserved condition in the Town of Haldimand will be brought up to standard usable conditions until such time as a Subdivision Agreement is entered into by the Town and those wishing to build homes on such unimproved roads.

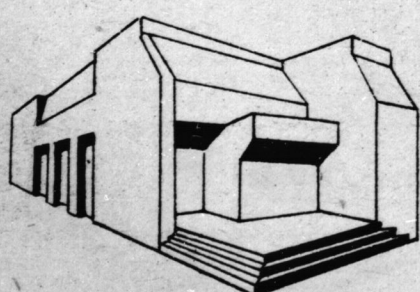
