## GRRRA Fear Dam Removal

Ratepayers living along the Grand River from Caledonia to Dunnville have banded together.

They're fighting any suggestion by Grand River Conservation Authority officials that

the dam at Dunnville be removed.

At a Town of Haldimand meeting in Cayuga Monday night, Orlon Hornbrook, Chairman of the Grand River Ratepayers Association, appeared before council to plead his case.

He told councillors there is a controversy in the area "over the repair, replacement or removal of the Dam...."

And he wants Town of Haldimand support at the regional level to ensure "that the existing dam will be repaired, the flood control weirs will be repaired and that temporary repairs to the second set of weirs will be made immediately."

He said the daily amount of effluent going into the Grand at present is 980,000 gallons from Brantford, 200,000 gallons from Caledonia

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## Protest Letter

The Ministry of Natural Resources will be receiving a protest letter from the Regional Municipality of Haldimand - Norfolk this month.

Councillors are objecting to the ministry's granting of a permit to Standard Industries Limited for operating a quarry just west of Hagersville.

Catherine Smale, chairman of the region's Planning and Development committee, said the ministry's move is in direct opposition to a resolution made by council.

However, Gordon Miller of Nanticoke told councillors the city gave their approval for the

13th Concession quarry operation which is located in the City of Nanticoke.

Councillor Lyle Furry of Haldimand suggested the region should be responsible for any decisions on it.

No presentation was ever made to Haldimand councillors. And "this is bad because one section of our community (Hagersville) is right on the edge of it," councillor Furry said.

Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd spoke strongly in favor of municipalities giving some consideration to the views of neighbouring municipalities. "It's a matter of principle," he said.

## H-N Favors Hwy. 3 Plaza

All but four Haldimand-Norfolk regional councillors favor a Highway 3 shopping plaza with "Department Store Type Merchandise".

After a closed session in Cayuga last Thursday morning with Regional Planner Roger Roberts, H-N councillors okayed the Norlynn shopping plaza slated for the outskirts of Simcoe (nine miles west of Jarvis)..... minus one of the Planner's key recommendations.

The Region's counsel will maintain the position, at this week's Ontario Municipal Board hearing on the plaza's fate, that there is no jurisdiction to hear the appeal.

If the Board disagrees, the Region's lawyer will relay council's position to the OMB on the plaza's merits. Councillors endorsed all of Mr. Roberts recommendations except

one which would limit the type of businesses to food stores, drug stores, banks or trust

companies, ladies and mens hairdressing and beauty establishments, (continued on page 5)

## Nanticoke Wants Uniform Hydro Rates

The City of Nanticoke wants uniform hydro rates for the entire municipality.

At a meeting in port Dover Friday, councillors voted in favor of petitioning the hydro electric power commission throughout the province to establish urban hydro rates across the city. At present urban and rural customers have separate fee schedules.

Five councillors, including Jim Davidson of Jarvis, voted against the motion.

Mr. Davidson later explained to The Record he voted negatively on the motion because urban bills will go up

if the entire city is put on a uniform rate basis. Also at council:

Nanticoke will recommend to the Region and Ministry of Environment that a trunk water main be installed at the earliest date to Jarvis with the possibility of a further extension to the Hagersville and Caledonia area.

Council approved a bylaw appointing Donald W. Kitchen as bylaw enforcement officer for the City of Nanticoke.

Nanticoke's Local Planning Advisory Committee members will be paid \$30 per meeting plus 15 cents per mile travelled to and from such meetings.
