Drugs and counterfeit money, that have been seized over the past 60 days, were displayed. He stated that although we hear a great deal about drugs, the greatest problem is alcohol.

Chief McCart was thanked by Lion Rick Miller and presented with a token gift and Certificate of Appreciation.

Hoss winners were - Ladies' High - Olga Church and ladies' low - Evelyn Brown.

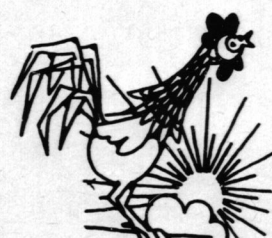
Men's High went to Dick Roberts and low went to Abe Hyde.

Home Renewal Program

Old homes are becoming "The Thing" to buy. Interest in renovating a run - down old farm house or updating a century home with new wiring or plumbing is growing amongst home-buyers and owners of all ages.

To help homeowners with a maximum annual loan of \$12,500, the Ontario Ministry of Housing has announced a program which provides provincial funding for home repairs and rehabilitation.

The new program, called Ontario Home Renewal Program, provides loans up to \$75,000.

Non - essential repairs or work such as additions to a home, a second bathroom or garage and beyond - minimum - standards work is not eligible for loans.

But essential housing repairs such as structural and sanitary improvements and the upgrading of plumbing, heating and electrical systems qualify.

Portions of the loans may be forgivable and interest rates on money to be paid back are geared to the homeowner's income. It ranges from no interest at all to a maximum of eight per cent per year.

The OHRP is administered directly by the participating municipality which, once it has been granted funds, handles applications, inspection, terms and amount of the loan and repayment.

New housing alone cannot meet the needs of all Ontario residents, and it is false economy to adopt the wholesale destruction of older neighborhoods or homes to accommodate new buildings. So this program has a lot to offer.

City of Nanticoke residents who might be interested in this program should talk with their councillors. At present Nanticoke has not adopted a minimum standard of housing and occupancy bylaw.

Unmasking The Great Masquerader

On October 6th, the members and friends of 85 Kinsmen Clubs, including Selkirk, Hagersville and Port Dover, and their Kinetite auxiliaries of District One of the Association will walk to unmask the "Great Masquerader" in a District - wide walkathon.

They will combine their strength to raise funds to help in the research to find a cure to the dreaded child killer, Cystic Fibrosis.

Cystic Fibrosis attacks the lungs of young children. It affects their breathing and digestion. Thick gluey mucus clogs the lungs and prevents the flow of the digestive juices from the pancreas to the small intestine. Ten years ago, C/F children died before reaching school age. Today, with early diagnosis and expert treatment, many affected youngsters stand a good chance of living beyond their teens.

Its symptoms often confuse doctors. C/F frequently masquerades as asthma, bronchitis, celiac disease or an allergy.

C/F kills more children than polio did before the Salk vaccine. The outlay of drugs and equipment to help one child fight it costs \$2,000 a year. It has a staggering effect on the emotional and financial security of many families.

The Association of Kinsmen in District One alone have raised \$102,000 for their research centre at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto which they have for the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. They have committed themselves to a further \$100,000 over the next three years.

The Kinettes and Kinsmen of our community ask our support to help them unmask the masquerader and defeat this Child Killer.

O.P.P. Report

On September 28th, a call was received reporting a vehicle being stolen from the parking lot at Explorer Inn, Jarvis.

Constable J. Milton proceeded to Jarvis and contacted owner. The vehicle was located in south ditch of Highway 3 just east of Nanticoke Road and had been involved in a one - car accident.

Investigation revealed that the owner was the driver of the vehicle at time of collision and reported vehicle stolen to avoid charges. Subsequently,

Industrial Park Plans
