GRRA Fear Dam Removal

and 100,000 gallons from Cayuga.

Mr. Hornibrook explained removal of the dam would cause a decrease in the volume of water and width of the river.

This river is an asset to the people of Caledonia, Cayuga, York and surrounding areas and we have no desire to see it turned into a narrow sewer conveying the effluent discharges from Brantford and Caledonia to Cayuga's water intake.

He further explained there are some people in Dunnville who are more interested in a Planned Housing Development which was surveyed in a low area and cannot be drained through the present storm sewer system.

"It is their feeling that if the Upper Grand was lowered by four feet, it would allow a trunk storm sewer to drain this area into the river," he said.

Mr. Hornibrook argued that this would only help the developers and interested investors; not the majority of people.

The dam controversy stems from a statement made in a committee of the whole meeting of the Town of Dunnville and passed on to a member of the public, the Dunnville Chronicle reports.

A GRCA official is quoted as saying "it's either repairs, replacement or removal and it depends on the people down here."

At a recent rate-

payers meeting in Dunnville, Regional Chairman John McCombs said he didn't think anyone has said the dam will be removed.

The GRCA proposed repairing, replacing "or" removing the dam, he said. And he felt the ratepayers should talk with GRCA officials from the area.

In a news release to the Record the G.R.C.A. said because of the worsening condition of the apron on the Dunnville Dam, the Grand River Conservation Authority representatives have met with local municipal officials to discuss both long and short term solutions to the problem.

It was agreed to determine what temporary repairs can be carried out in the near future and also examine longer term solutions including the possibility of constructing a new dam and possibly incorporating a lock into the dam structure, or removing the dam completely because of its minimal value as a flood control structure.

As a result of this discussion, the authority executive has decided not to allow any buildings below the agreed upon flood line (roughly along Main Street) until either the municipality requests that the line be reconsidered or until a decision is made regarding the future of the Dunnville Dam which may affect the flood line.

Also at the meeting: * Town of Haldimand council is seeking \$40,000 under the federal government's Local Initiative Program.

Public Works Committee chairman Blake Gloyd told councillors any money received through the program

would be used for various clean-up jobs.

LIP, which is designed to provide for jobs for people out of work, will pay all labour costs. The municipality must pick up the tab on any supplies or equipment used.

* Mr. Gloyd presented certificates to two Public Works employees for their successful completion of courses at the C.S. Anderson School in Guelph.

Don Richards of Area 1 received a maintenance management certificate.

Ken Stone of Area 2 received an equipment maintenance certificate.

* Clean up day in the town will be on October 15th. Items other than garbage will be picked up from 8 a.m. at the curb.

* The resignation of Murray Killman from the Haldimand Library Board was accepted. Derek Bishop was appointed in his place.

* The Town of Haldimand declared October 8th World Lions Service Day.

Selkirk Kinsmen Walk For Cystic Fibrosis

The Kinsmen Club of Selkirk will be joining fellow Kinsmen and Kinette auxiliaries for a walkathon from Selkirk to Hagersville this Sunday, October 6.

More than 2500 Kinsmen from Windsor to Burlington are walking in 10 centres to raise money for Cystic Fibrosis Research. Hagersville and Port Dover branches will also be pounding the pavement Sunday.

The Kinsmen Clubs are seeking sponsors for the walk which will take them from the Selkirk Community Park by the Rainham Road and Indian Line to Nelles Corners to Hagersville - a distance of 20 miles.
