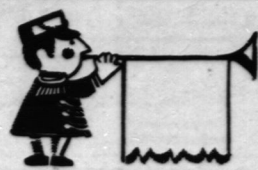


Hagersville Highlights



Celebrate Diamond Anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Simington of Main Street North, Hagersville, will celebrate their diamond wedding anniversary with a family dinner at the Cove Room in Port Dover on Sunday, October 6th and will have an "Open House" to welcome their friends and relatives in the Hagersville United Church on Monday, October 7th, from 7 to 9 p.m.

The couple was married by Rev. A.R. Springer on October 7, 1914 in Oakland United Manse, with the couple residing at Burch for the first few years of their marriage. Moving

to Hagersville in 1926, they continued farming as well as doing motor repairs. This was the beginning of Simington Motors.

They had three sons, Wray, Carl and Lloyd

(deceased), and have eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Both are members of the Orange Lodge and the Hagersville United Church.

Hagersville Water "Filthy"

Haldimand - Norfolk Regional Chairman, John McCombs, recently described the water of Hagersville as "filthy" and "terrible" and personally admitted he wouldn't drink it himself by choice. But there still seems to be no immediate answer to the problem.

"For the moment it looks as though all we can do is limit growth in the area," he said.

A supply pipe is already planned from the Lake to Jarvis, six miles away, but authorities are awaiting development of the Nanticoke satellite city before deciding to pipe the water into Hagersville.

The region's health department has taken some tests and has asked the Ministry of the Environment to conduct more extensive tests.

Firemen Called

On Friday evening, September 27th, Keith Reid passed a suspicious outbreak of flames on the First Line of Oneida, Town of Haldimand.

The fire "appeared to be deliberately set in three or four different places," stated Hagersville's Fire Chief William McClarty. They were situated on the northern side of the road

and at the western end of the overhead bridge on the First Line.

Upon the arrival at the scene, the firemen rapidly extinguished the various outbreaks of flames.

A train crossing the tracks in Hagersville at the time of the call created some confusion and delayed the trucks at the tracks for a brief period. It was also noted that traffic pulled over to the side of the road for the emergency vehicles to proceed more quickly on Highway # 6.

6.5 Acres For Conveyor Belt

Stelco wants 6.5 acres of "resort-residential" land near Nanticoke rezoned "industrial".

The 270' by 748' corridor is their planned site for a conveyor belt system which would transport such bulk commodities as coal, coke and iron ore from a dock to their steel-making facilities further inland.

Regional councillors gave their approval to an amendment of the Walpole Planning Area Official Plan Thursday.

Stelco must meet the following conditions:

* That the industrial special use designation would be solely for the purposes of constructing and maintaining a conveyor belt system and confined to an area of approximately 6.5 acres in a somewhat rectangular parcel measuring approximately 270' x 748'.

* That assurances would be provided for the control of noise, dust, and vibrations emanating from the conveyor belt system along the easement from the dock facility to the plant site.

* That fencing and appropriate safety measures restricting public access to the conveyor belts and easement be erected or installed.

* That boundary noise levels at the residential/industrial interface

not exceed a maximum of 65 dbA for daytime periods and a maximum of 55 dbA for nighttime, based upon continuous noise levels.

* That the conveyor system be covered, or protected as required, to prevent dust blow-off along the easement.

* That the conveyor system be depressed below grade - level and

located between earth mounds and tree plantings to attenuate sound and to screen it from view and from the wind.

* That any other environmental requirements of both the Governments of Ontario and Canada be strictly adhered to and, as required, be subject to periodic and continuous monitoring.

Welfare Assistance Up

Effective October 1, 1974, allowances for recipients of Family Benefits and General Welfare Assistance will be increased.

Rene Brunelle, Ontario Minister of Community and Social Services, announced today the revised allowance schedules and increased earnings exemptions will represent an increase of

approximately 15% to provincial expenditures under Family Benefits and General Welfare Assistance.

Affected will be 58,500 provincial Family Benefits recipients and 45,000 recipients of provincial and municipal General Welfare Assistance, and their families. These include mothers with dependent children, dependents of GAINS (Guaranteed Annual Income Supplement) recipients, aged persons not eligible for GAINS, needy foster children and persons unable to work.

New Minister For Clanbrassil

This summer, Rev. Paul N. Scrutton and his wife Janice, moved into the manse of the United Church at Clanbrassil which serves parishioners of both Oneida and York.

He was born in England in 1927 and has a varied and interesting background which covers service in the military, education and more recently, service with the Ontario Probation Services at Thunder Bay. They have four children.

Nanticoke Church Celebrates 100th

First Class Mail Definition

Letters, postcards, and other articles paid at the first class rate and receiving preferred handling throughout the service shall not be less than five and one half inches in length and three and one half inches in width.

The rates for a letter are:

Over	Up To	
0 oz.	1 oz.	8¢
1 oz.	2 oz.	14¢
2 oz.	4 oz.	20¢
4 oz.	8 oz.	32¢
8 oz.	12 oz.	44¢
12 oz.	16 oz.	54¢

Letters over this weight are called Letter Packets. They run from 1 lb. to 66 lb. and are sent by first class mail.

So when mailing that letter, if it feels a little heavy, get it weighed or your friend will have to pay double the deficiency. Next week we will deal with first class rates to the U.S.A.
