Bernier Differs On Number Of Non-Residential Licences

The left hand doesn't seem to know what the right hand is doing in Queen's Park.

At least not when it comes to determining whether Nanticoke is one municipality or more, according to City of Nanticoke councillor Ken Porteous.

At a meeting in Port Dover Tuesday, councillors read a letter from the Minister of Natural Resources, Leo Bernier, on the question of granting non - resident hunting licences.

He explained the "new corporation embraces three former townships in which the minimum non - resident licences to be made available were 200 per town-

ship. It therefore follows that the minimum number of licences to be made available to non - residents for the new corporation will be six hundred and there will be no limit to the number of resident licences."

Nanticoke has only issued 200 non-resident licences so far this season because they considered themselves one municipality in the new region of Haldimand - Norfolk. The ministry requires each municipality to issue a minimum of 200 in order to receive protection under the Game and Fish Act.

The letter prompted Mr. Porteous to suggest

the left hand doesn't know what the right one is doing.

Recreation grants have been cut from six (the number of municipalities comprising Nanticoke) to one because they consider us one municipality "Yet the minister obviously here thinks of us as three," Mr. Porteous commented. "I'd like to see whether we are 1, 3 or 6."

Mayor John Pow pointed out that the neighbouring town of Haldimand has only issued 200.

Haldimand councillors were told at their September 9th meeting by Ross Leef, a Con-

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No Gas Cut For Schools

The University of Waterloo may be cut off from natural gas supplies because of a possible gas shortage in 1976.

But schools under the jurisdiction of the Haldimand Board of Education, now being converted from oil to

natural gas, have no fear of being placed in the same dilemma. One hundred and thirty Ontario gas users have received letters suggesting they seek alternative sources of fuel.

This shortage is in relation to those who

require "fantastic high loads," Don Moore, Operations Manager for Union says.

"Someone like CIL uses more gas than all of Hamilton including Stelco....." What the company is saying, he explained, is that they should reserve supplies for residential and smaller commercial uses.

Both Hagersville and Cayuga Secondary Schools are being converted to natural gas.

Jake Fransen, Director of Education, says Union Gas is putting the line in to C.S.S. and the Board is continuing with their conversion plans.

Mr. Moore added in his conversation with the Record that there is plenty of natural gas (the Arctic and other places) but it is a question of getting it to a market.

Bill Knowles (PC, Haldimand - Norfolk) named last week the citizens he has chosen to comprise his constituency Advisory Group.

This group has been formed to screen all applications for federal Local Initiatives Program (LIP) projects in the constituency.

Godfrey of St. Williams; Joseph V.J. Murphy of Delhi; Kenneth Best of Cayuga; and Robert Dell of Cayuga. Alternates will be Bruce Edwards of York; Wayne Elliott of Simcoe; Charles E. Pearce of Hagersville and Keith Shay of Waterford.

Similar advisory groups are being set up across the country to bring L.I.P. closer to the community and to weed out questionable projects which have induced public criticism in the past.

Mr. Knowles indicated that the \$90

million the government is allocating to the L.I.P. will be better spent under the auspices of such groups.

They will help cut out "Wasteful and frivolous" projects, he added. He also said he felt there were better ways for government funds to be used to assist local municipal governments. However, since a minimum of \$75,000 will be allocated to Norfolk - Haldimand, "every precaution should be taken to ensure that these funds are used to the best possible advantage for our particular area."
