Missionary Family Returns To Area

Twelve years of mission service in India has ended for a former Cheapside resident.

The Reverend Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Sider and family have returned to Canada to start a new life.

They left for India in September, 1962. And after a year of language study in Allahabad, plunged into mission work in the province of Bihar.

Mr. Sider was later named superintendent of BIC missions in India. Their two children, Cheryl and Steven, attended boarding school in Woodstock, an American based public and high school, Upper Province in Northern India.

Earlier in his career, Mr. Sider served the Walpole community as a public school teacher—three years in his home area of Cheapside and five years as principal of the Jarvis Public School.

During this time he received Ordination to the Christian ministry and was assistant pastor to his father, Rev. E.M. Sider, in Cheapside. In July, 1967, he left the Jarvis - Cheapside area and married his wife, Erma, who was also a teacher.

He took up residence in Toronto and pastored the BIC Church on Gamble Avenue. He graduated with his B.D. Degree in 1962.

Mr. Sider and his family will be returning to Cheapside Sunday evening, October 13. They will be showing pictures and telling of

their work in India at the Brethren In Christ Church at 8 p.m.

They will be happy to meet all old friends, school children, pupils, teachers and associates.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Women's Missionary Prayer Circle.

A NEW LOOK AT THE U.S.

Canadians and Americans are closely bound together by their very geographic situation. This is enhanced by the fact that we both speak the same language, both hear each other's Radio and T.V. programmes and are also very much intertwined in the financial and industrial aspects of life. "Personnel" passes freely from one to the other.

There are those who are against everything that is American and are proud to declare themselves Anti-American, and there are those who care nothing about it, who might almost be called Pro-American.

But there is another attitude we might take, and that is gratitude. We really owe a lot to the Americans. In the first place we should be thankful that they did not send in any army in the early days to conquer our West and B.C. The war of 1812 was only a skirmish. Here is how one man puts it: - "How can you account for an honest - to - God imperialist power losing half a continent to a handful of settlers who were scattered over the broad, almost boundless western prairies and who did not have a road or a language to hold them together?" That the Americans might easily have taken everything west of Winnipeg is surely something for which we can be grateful --- if we are real Canadians. Then there are the economical and social benefits we have received. How many people would be out of work if all American capital were to suddenly be withdrawn from Canada?

I am not a Pro-American, nor an Anti but I think we should look at both sides of the matter; that our two countries should live and work together as partners.

However, I must say that I think we Canadians must live up to and maintain our share of the partnership.

Hydro Increase

Ontario Hydro announced last week rate increases for electricity for 1975. Effective January 1, the average wholesale rate to municipal utility systems will go up by 12.4 per cent. Rates to customers of Hydro's rural system will be increased by 11.4 per cent and large industrial customers served directly by Hydro will pay an average of 15.2 per cent more.

From the Crop Science Department, Guelph, we learn that corn kernels continue to develop for two to three weeks after frost.

Many fields where the corn was not quite mature when the frost occurred are expected to put on another 10 to 20 bushels per acre during this period.

Because this development reduces the sugar levels in the lower stalk, lodging or stalk breakage could be more severe. It is suggested that harvesting should

not be delayed more than necessary.
