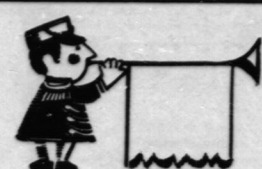


Hagersville Highlights



Evaluation At H.S.S.

The staff at Hagersville Secondary School is undertaking an experiment of evaluation for this school year. Student progress will be evaluated entirely on

the work done day to day, without the traditional examinations at Christmas and in June.

Major tests, which are an hour in length, essays, reports, seminars, classroom participation and work habits will form the principal basis for evaluation.

The objective is to stress the importance of consistent effort from day to day. Students who are faithful in doing their homework and who satisfactorily complete their projects and other assignments

will probably be successful at school, as they would be in the working world. The student who used to coast along and cram for the exams will have to find a new approach to learning.

Evaluation will be going on consistently in all subjects. Major tests will be spaced equally every quarter of the school year.

This experiment will be evaluated next June by both staff and students. We will then decide whether to continue the experiment, to modify it, or to return to the use of examinations.

Haldimand Library Board Looks To Future

The Town of Haldimand Library Board took a look at the future at its last board meeting.

Mr. Bill McKinnie, Librarian at Hagersville Secondary School spoke on his findings after a study of the Hagersville, Caledonia and Cayuga Public Libraries this summer.

Using the Public Library Standards plus population statistics projected by regional government, and our current figures, Mr. McKinnie pointed out

strengths and weaknesses in our present system. He gave the board much to ponder concerning the size and composition of our book collections, the space available in our libraries and the problems we might face by 1981, if the population reaches its projected figure of approximately 22,000.

The Library Board, concerned with providing quality service to all people in Haldimand, accepted the report with thanks and will refer to it often when planning

for growth in the near future.

In other business, the board directed Mrs. Anne Corlis, Co-ordinating Librarian, to purchase a new charging desk for the Cayuga Library, and to make recommendations on the purchase of a table and chairs and a rug for the Cayuga Library.

Mrs. G. Abercrombie, Mrs. M. Edwards, Mrs. S. McKinnie, and Mrs. P. Stallwood were confirmed as permanent staff members.

Haldimand To Hire Recreation Director

Town of Haldimand is hiring a recreation director to start working in the municipality January 1, 1975.

Recreation and Community Services Committee Chairman Robert Dell told councillors last week that just as the Public Works departments needs superintendents, so does the recreation field.

He explained the duties of the Director would not be to direct,

but rather to plan, coordinate, administer, evaluate and supervise. This person would have responsibility for three arenas, two pools, athletic fields, etc.

Several councillors expressed concern over how this person would work in relation to the many volunteers who donate their time.

"A good director could either make or break the whole works," Councillor Jack Young said.

And Councillor Harold Cruikshank expressed hope the hiring committee would use a great deal of scrutiny and pick somebody with a lot of tact. A lot of volunteers are going to see this person making \$14,000 and see how much work they've done themselves, he added.

Councillor Pat Mackereth, a member of the Recreation Committee, said they hoped to find a very good person in community relations who would encourage volunteer help and assist them.

The motion to hire a Director was approved.
