C.C. Parker Opens Branch On Jarvis Main Street

Stelco Makes Bid For Equalized Assessment

Municipalities in the Haldimand-Norfolk Region can't work in little competitive compartments with something as mammoth as the Stelco Industrial Complex and its tax revenue, Eric Hardy told regional councillors last Thursday.

The consultant is working for the Steel Company of Canada on the whole question of tax equalization.

And they have drafted

legislation which could permit regional council to equalize the assessment through bylaw as they see fit.

Mr. Hardy feels it is urgent that H - N pursue this avenue.

He said he has talked with James Allan, MPP for Haldimand-Norfolk, and the amendment to the province's Bill 226 (An Act to amend the Regional Municipality of Haldimand - Norfolk Act, 1973) could

fall. His proposal is simply the permissive legislation which would allow councillors to address themselves to the problem of spreading the wealth.

Mr. Hardy explained there may be residential developments moving ahead of industrial growth in various areas which need financial help.

25 Cent Charge Coming

Beginning Sunday, November 3, 1974, a charge of 25 cents will be made for unnecessary calls to Directory Assistance (411), R.J. Munro, Bell Canada manager, reminded customers in the Cayuga, Fisherville, Hagersville and Selkirk exchanges today.

"Because Directory Assistance calls from these locations are handled by our Hamilton office, where the charge is also being initiated on November 3, they

were included at this time," Mr. Munro said. "Brantford and Simcoe will have their directory Assistance calls handled by our Kitchener office. The charge for unnecessary calls will be implemented in these exchanges in March of 1975."

The charge is also being initiated in the Toronto and Montreal areas on November 3. Other locations served by Bell Canada will all

be phased in by March 1975.

"However," said Mr. Munro, "there is no need for any customer to ever incur Directory Assistance charges. Charges will be made only when a customer is provided with a number that is already listed in the telephone book. In addition, there will be no charge for the first three chargeable calls a month from residence services only."

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
