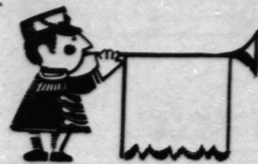


## Hagersville Highlights



### Hagersville Church Celebrates 105th

Rev. Leslie McSpadden conducted the Sunday Morning Worship service for Hagersville United Church, at which time the 105th Anniversary was observed. Guest speaker Rev. David Proctor, the Personnel Officer for Hamilton Conference and a member of Erie Presbytery, told the children's story. He spoke of a birthday Party and asked the children what made such a party complete.

At this time Karen Esselment, Junior Congregation baby-sitter, carried in an attractive birthday cake with six candles. Rev. Proctor explained the large one in the centre represented 100 years and each of the five smaller around the outside one more year.

The Junior Choir members sang "The Lord's My Shepherd" to the tune of Happy Wanderer, led by their leader Mrs. Joyce Bradshaw. Church organist, Mrs. Isabelle Dorey, accompanied soloist Mrs. A. Essel-

ment who sang "Bless This Church." The sermon topic, "The Company of the Committed," Dr. Proctor said, "... in each of us there is a small portion of child- ishness, wherein we are constantly complaining of the weather; the police; inflation; the school system; establishment, etc."

"However, in each of us also, there is a streak of parental control, even in a little

child playing house."

He suggested "no matter if you are 8 or 80, why not express your feelings and attitudes with a smile or chuckle - just as many here today in this magnificent Sanctuary have done on the 105th birthday of the Hagersville United Church."

In closing, he said, "it is God's will that we be joyful and happy Christians and therefore believe the long - faced solemnity of our ancestors in religion must now go."

## On The Green

The Hagersville Lawn Bowlers Club, of Alma Street South, will use the recently issued "New Horizons Grant" to improve the drainage green, the drainage and replace some old out dated equipment.

Recently Health and Welfare Minister Marc Lalonde announced the awarding of a 4,133 "New Horizons" Grant to a group of retired people in Hagersville,

for the development of special community projects.

The New Horizons is a Federal Government program, which is designed to encourage retired people to take an active part in the life of the community where they live.

Since this program began in 1972, a total of \$15,599,645.00 has been awarded in grants to 2,825 projects in Canada.

## Jehovah's Witnesses Told What The Near Future Holds

52 delegates from the Hagersville congregation were in attendance at the semi-annual assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses held at Highland Secondary School, Dundas, Ontario October 19 and 20.

Mr. Edward Upton, R.R. 5, Hagersville, spokesman for the Witnesses in the Hagersville area, said that the two-day program encouraged the Witnesses to maintain their stable Christian conduct and not cave in under increasing pressures of everyday life.

The principle speaker at the gathering, Keith McCann, delivered the public address, "What the Near Future Holds" to a crowd of 1,192 on Sunday afternoon.

He reiterated the main thrust of the Witnesses' message, which is that the Kingdom of God will soon bring to an end present world governments and, thereafter, establish a thousand-year era of peace.

McCann, District Overseer for the work of Jehovah's Witnesses in southern Ontario,

opened his address by asking, "Will continued inflation destroy our security? Will food supplies run out? Will dangers to our health or safety grow? Can the nations prevent the outbreak of terrifying wars?" Throughout the discourse, McCann frequently used the scriptures to answer these questions.

He stated, "We should not be shocked or thrown off balance by coming world developments, but rather, being alerted to what it all

means, and knowing the rest of what the future holds, we will wait on Jehovah."

Mr. Upton said that nine new ministers were ordained at the baptismal ceremony on Sunday morning.

Mr. Kostoff of R.R. 1, Port Dover, is a member of the Hagersville congregation. He is 80 years of age and has been attending meetings such as these for 52 years, since his baptism in 1922.

**FEHRMAN, Chester**—It was with deep regret the people of Selkirk and community learned of the sudden death of Chester Fehrman on Wednesday, October 16, 1974. The deceased who was known as "Pete" to his many friends, was born in Walpole Township in 1904, the eldest son of Jackson Fehrman and Margaret Smelser, and but for a few years spent in Hamilton, lived in the Selkirk area all his life.

In 1925 he married Lillian Dennis in Hamilton, Ontario, who survives him. Also three children, Glenn of Temagami, Nora (Mrs. William Bassindale) of Selkirk and Grant of Hamilton. Eleven grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, his mother Mrs. Margaret Fehrman, sister Mrs. Leatha Jolley and Mrs. Nellie Culp all of Hamilton, Mrs. Annie Duxbury of Hagersville, brothers Elmo and John of Selkirk.

For several years Mr. Fehrman was a commercial fisherman on Lake Erie. In 1957 he purchased the Texaco Service Station in Selkirk, retiring from this business in 1970.

Funeral service was held at the Hyde and Mott Funeral Home in Hagersville on October 18 and was conducted by Mr. Fehrman's pastor, the Rev. C.B. Carr of Faith Centennial United Church, Selkirk. Pallbearers were Blake Held, Howard Lindsay, Blake Stadder, Harold Evans, Ivan Sheppard and Elmo Murphy. Burial took place in Selkirk Union Cemetery.

**EDWIN S. FLEMING** died at Ottawa Civic Hospital September 11, 1974 after an illness of three months. Born in Goulbourn Township on September 3, 1905, he was a son of the late John Fleming and his wife, the late Catherine Ann Simpson.

He is survived by his wife, Doris; a daughter Anne (Mrs. George McGinnis) of Des Ormeaux, Quebec, and one brother Earl Fleming, Carleton Place and two sisters; Lilly (Mrs. Thomas Simpson) Carleton Place and Maude (Mrs. O. Patrick) Ottawa.

Mr. Fleming was predeceased by four brothers and three sisters. The funeral took place Saturday, September 14, 1974 at Kerry FUNERAL HOME 61 Lake Avenue, Carleton Place with Archdeacon John A. Salter officiating. The burial was in Dewars Cemetery.

Mr. Fleming was a member of St. John's Lodge AF and AM, Stella Lodge IOOF, Carleton Place, and L.O.L. 97 Ash-ton. He was a member of the first C.P. & D. Memorial Hospital Board in January 1950 and served on the board until the opening of the hospital in 1955.

Mr. Fleming was married to Doris Ineson at Jarvis, Ontario, January 6, 1932.

TWELVE (12) MEMBERS TO BE ELECTED BY PUBLIC SCHOOL SUPPORTERS as follows:

TOWNSHIP OF NORFOLK - Three (3) Members to be elected. Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the Township of Norfolk.

TOWNSHIP OF DELHI - Three (3) Members to be elected. Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the Township of Delhi.

TOWN OF SIMCOE - Three (3) Members to be elected. Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the Town of Simcoe.

CITY OF NANTICOKE - Three (3) Members to be elected as follows:

WARD II - One (1) Member (Ward II comprises the former Town of Port Dover and Township of Woodhouse and except that portion which was transferred to the Town of Simcoe.)

WARD III - Two (2) Members (Ward III comprises the former Town of Waterford and Township of Townsend save and except that portion which was transferred to the Town of Simcoe.)

Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the City of Nanticoke.

FOUR (4) MEMBERS TO BE ELECTED to represent SEPARATE SCHOOL ELECTORS on the Norfolk County Board of Education as follows:

TOWNSHIP OF NORFOLK - One (1) Member to be elected. Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the Township of Norfolk.

TOWNSHIP OF DELHI - Two (2) Members to be elected. Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the Township of Delhi.

TOWN OF SIMCOE and CITY OF NANTICOKE - One (1) Member to be elected. (The Town of Simcoe and Ward II and Ward III of the City of Nanticoke are combined for the purpose of electing one (1) member to represent the Separate School Electors on the Norfolk County Board of Education.)

Nomination Papers to be filed with the Returning Officer of the City of Nanticoke. CANDIDATES are required to submit nominations on prescribed forms only. Such forms may be obtained from the Municipal Offices listed below.

NOTICE is also given that the Municipal Elections Act, 1972 provides that a Nomination Paper:

(a) Shall be signed by at least ten (10) electors whose names are entered in the Polling Lists of Electors entitled to vote in an election to such office;

(b) Shall state the name, occupation and address of the candidate in such a manner as will identify him and the office for which he is nominated;

(c) Shall state the name and address of each elector signing the nomination paper. TAKE NOTICE that where the candidate is running in a Ward, his Nomination Paper must be signed by persons on the Polling List of Electors in that specific Ward.

NOTE: In accordance with Section 34(3)(4) of the Municipal Election Act, 1972, a Nomination Paper nominating a candidate for

(a) Public School Board member shall be signed by Public School electors only; and

(b) Separate School Board members shall be signed by Separate School electors only.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE THAT THE ONUS IS ON THE PERSON NOMINATED FOR ELECTION TO AN OFFICE TO FILE A BONA FIDE NOMINATION PAPER.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that a candidate may withdraw his nomination by filing an instrument in writing, verified by his affidavit and delivered to the Returning Officer before 5 o'clock in the afternoon on Wednesday, November 13th, 1974.
