## H.S.S. Roof Repairs In Home Stretch

Work on the infamous Hagersville Secondary School roof is in the home stretch now.

But it may be another month before it is finally completed.

Wheels were first set in motion last year to have the leaking roof mended. And in January of this year, Culp Construction Limited won the job of recapping it with a tender bid of \$84,212.

Haldimand Board of Education property committee members

had hoped it would be done before the September school opening.


However, the whole recapping job is much slower than the sub-contractor anticipated, Business Administrator Bruce King said in Cayuga last Thursday. They had strike problems and ran into more work than expected, he said.

To further complicate the matter, an extensive leak during repairs in June caused floor

damage in the school auditorium.

The Board dickered with the contractor and insurance company during July and August over this matter. And an agreement has now been reached whereby the contractor, through his insurance, will repair the damaged floor at a cost of \$2,405.

An additional expenditure of \$1,517 will have to be made by the Board to refinish the remaining portion of the floor and also repaint the lines.





## Cayuga Materials Awarded Contract

Cayuga Materials and Construction Ltd. has been awarded a \$187,117 contract to do road work near Jarvis.


In a letter to The Record, James N. Allan, MPP for Haldimand -

Norfolk, said the Cayuga-based company has been awarded contract No. 74 - 115 for doing the grading, drainage, granular base and hot mix paving for 5.66 miles of road.

The section is from Jarvis' west limits westerly to County Road No. 5 (Cockshutt Road) near Renton.

Mr. Allan said the work is scheduled to get underway September 10.

## Fire Destroys Trailer, Straw



The Jarvis Fire Department was called to the Stelco site at R.R. 1, Nanticoke (former Blake Field farm) Thursday morning. A trailer load of straw, owned by Phil Hare, ignited when a worker lit a match nearby. The blaze spread to surrounding stubble. Mr. Hare, who rents the land from the steel company, estimated damage at \$2,500.
