Wallace Fess is a patient in Aest Haldimand General Hospital in Hagersville.

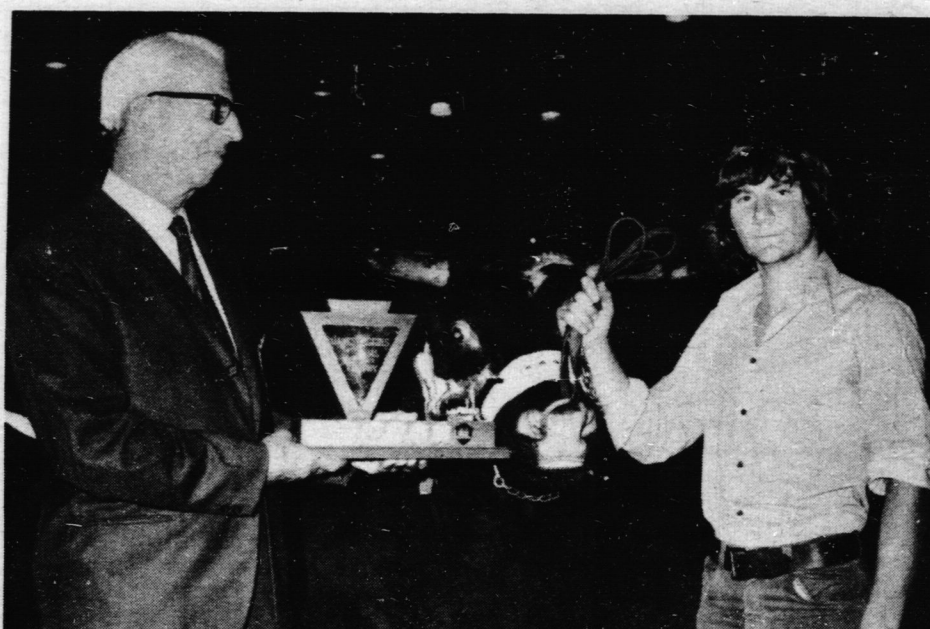

* A bowl displaced by a "non - toucher" rebounding from the bank shall be restored as near as possible to its original position by a member of the opposing side.

* If a bowl, while in motion or at rest on the green, or a "toucher" in the ditch, be interfered with or displaced by one of the players, the opposing skip shall have the option of: restoring the bowl as near as possible to its original position; letting it remain where it rests; declaring the bowl "dead"; or playing the end anew in the same direction.

* If a bowl, while in motion or at rest on the green or a "toucher" in the ditch be interfered with or displaced

by an individual not playing on the rink or by a bowl from another rink or by any object, the two skips shall come to an agreement regarding its position. The two skips failing to agree, the end shall be played anew in the same direction. Displacement inadvertently produced - if a bowl be moved at the time of its being marked or measured it shall be restored to its former position by an opponent. If such displacement is caused by a Marker or an Umpire, the Marker or Umpire shall replace the bowl.

Haldimand School Extended Program

Nine students between the ages of 16 and 20 are ready for an extended educational program at the Haldimand School, trustee Jennifer Eustace said at a meeting of the Haldimand Board of Education in Cayuga last Thursday.

In presenting the Advisory Committee report for the Haldimand School for the Mentally Retarded, Mrs. Eustace explained there are six boys and three girls in need of a better suited program.

The school's administrative staff has outlined a special academic instruction and vocational experience program for the class. And they designed a special class area in the Education Services Building.

Mrs. Eustace said the vocational experience program would offer four special courses in horticulture, home and institutional cleaning, woodwork and crafts and vehicle servicing.

The Board agreed to implement this program Thursday night.
