THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF HALDIMAND-NORFOLK
NOTICE OF ROAD CLOSING

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk propose to pass the following By-law at its meeting to be held at the Council Chambers, Cayuga, Ontario, on the 10th day of October, 1974.

WHEREAS Section 39 of an act to amend The Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk Act, 1973, Chapter 155, confers upon the Regional Corporation all the powers of the Municipal Act with respect to roads in the Regional Roads System and the regulation of traffic thereon;

WHEREAS Section 443 of The Municipal Act, R.S.O., 1970, Chapter 284, and amendments thereto, authorizes a Municipality to pass By-laws for the stopping up of any highway;

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to stop up and sell all of the allowance for road and the widening of the said road in the City of Nanticoke in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk being part of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, in Concessions I - II and all of the allowance for road between Concessions I - II, formerly in the Geographic Township of Walpole, in the County of Haldimand, commencing at the westerly limit of Lot 1, thence easterly to a point distant 748.38 feet east of the line between Lots 3 and 4, in said Concession II;

AND WHEREAS the provisions of Section 446 of the Municipal Act, R.S.O., 1970, Chapter 284, have been compiled with.

NOW THEREFORE be it enacted and is hereby enacted as by By-law of the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk as follows:

1. THAT all of the allowance for roads between Concessions I - II on the widening of the said road, by Regional Plan No. 50616, in the former Township of Walpole which said road and parcels are more particularly described as follows:

Description:
ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Nanticoke, in the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk, being parts of Lot 4, Lot 3, Lot 2, Lot 1, in Concession II, parts of Lot 1, Lot 2, Lot 3, Lot 4, in Concession I, part of the original allowance for road between Concessions I and II, formerly in the Geographic Township of Walpole, in the County of Haldimand, in the Province of Ontario, which said parcel is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the bearings herein are referred to those shown on Registered Plan Number 50616 for the former County of Haldimand;

COMMENCING at a point in the northerly limit of said plan 50616, distant 748.38 feet, measured easterly therefrom from a line between said Lots 4 and 3, Concession II;

THENCE South seventy-eight degrees ten minutes west along the northerly limit of said Plan 50616, 724.12 feet;

THENCE along the northerly limit of said Plan 50616 South 77 degrees and 53 minutes West, 3,155.95 feet;

THENCE North 15 degrees 09 minutes West, 7.01 feet;

THENCE South 77 degrees and 53 minutes West along the northerly limit of said Plan 50616, 233.07;

THENCE along the north limit of said plan 50616, South seventy-eight degrees, 07 minutes West, 2,883.64 feet more or less to the westerly limit of said Lot 1 in Concession II of the former Township of Walpole;

THENCE South 15 degrees and 17 minutes east 17.04 feet more or less to the South-west angle of said Lot 1, Concession II, former Township of Walpole;

THENCE South 15 degrees 17 minutes East 33.06 feet to the center of the allowance for road between Concession I and II of the former Township of Walpole;

THENCE South 15 degrees 17 minutes 30 seconds East 33.06 feet more or less to the north-west angle of said Lot 1, Concession 1, former Township of Walpole;

THENCE South 15 degrees 17 minutes 30 seconds East along the westerly limit of said Lot 1, Concession 1, former Township of Walpole 22.2 feet;

THENCE North seventy-eight degrees 07 minutes east along the southerly limit of said Plan No. 50616, 526.12 feet;

THENCE North 11 degrees 53 minutes West 5 feet;

THENCE North 78 degrees 07 minutes east along the southerly limit of said Plan No. 50616, 2,276.41 feet;

THENCE North 11 degrees 53 minutes West 7 feet;

THENCE North 78 degrees 07 minutes East along southerly limit of said Plan No. 50616, 75.09 feet;

THENCE North 77 degrees 53 minutes East along southerly limit of said Plan No. 50616, 3,350.75 feet;

THENCE North 15 degrees 37 minutes 30 seconds West, 8.55 feet;

THENCE North 77 degrees 55 minutes 30 seconds east along the northerly limit of said Lot 3, Concession 1, the former Township of Walpole 20.03 feet more or less to the north-east angle of said Lot 3, Concession 1, former Township of Walpole;

THENCE North 78 degrees 00 minutes east along the northerly limit of said Lot 4, Concession 1, former Township of Walpole 20.03 feet;

THENCE South 15 degrees 37 minutes 30 seconds east 8.49 feet;

THENCE North 78 degrees 10 minutes east along the southerly limit of said Plan of 50616, 722.68 feet;

THENCE North 11 degrees 50 minutes West 86 feet more or less to the place of commencement.

2. THAT the said road hereinbefore described be disposed of in accordance with provisions of The Municipal Act.

3. THAT the Chairman and the Clerk of the Regional Municipality of Haldimand-Norfolk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver conveyances to those entitled to execute and deliver conveyances to those entitled pursuant to the provisions of The Municipal Act, and to affix the Regional Seal of the Region thereto.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the Council shall hear in person or by its council, solicitor or agent, any person who claims, that his land will be prejudicially affected by By-law, and who applies to be heard.
