sation, if desired, would have to be established in a local bylaw.

And he said there are only two persons working out of Fonthill who are responsible for protecting the Regional Municipality of Niagara and Haldimand against any hunting irregularities or abuses.

Councillors felt the \$3 licence fee for non-resident hunters was ridiculously low and two people are not enough to cover Niagara and Haldimand adequately.

All Town of Haldimand licences will be issued from the Administration building in Cayuga.

**Nanticoke**  
City of Nanticoke councillors do not want to sell more than 200 non-resident hunting licences for the upcoming season either.

Mayor Pow said in Port Dover Tuesday, the municipality has to be careful issuing licences because it has lost thousands of acres to the

Nanticoke industrial complex and perhaps some to the satellite city. And this will put pressure on the remaining area with increased hunters, he said.

The municipality also wants to adopt a former Townsend Township bylaw which stipulates no licences are to be sold to Americans.

Non-resident licences will be sold in Port Dover while resident licences will be issued in Selkirk, Jarvis, Watford, Springvale and Port Dover.

Both Haldimand and Nanticoke agreed to only sell one hunting licence per person.

In the past individuals have tried to pick up licences for as many as 15 friends and this they intend to stop.

## Federation News

The Canadian Federation of Agriculture held its semi-annual meeting in Edmonton recently. Some points of interest in the report from Provinces are:

Saskatchewan's hog stabilization program geared to the Federal program with the objective of reducing it to a floor price of \$46 per cwt. from the present \$57.

Manitoba - cattle are more plentiful, being fed on farms by the farmer

rather than in feedlots. The hog situation is up in the air because of changing pricing systems and prices are considerably weaker.

B.C. - has an income assurance act in place. Some milk is under this act now. Negotiations for price take place monthly and currently \$13 per cwt. is the price for fluid milk. There is a plan for hogs. The price is 65¢ per lb. Vegetable crops, apples, etc. are applying under the Act.

Nova Scotia has an interest forgiveness program (two-year program) for young farmers entering agriculture. N.S. has the same problems regarding

eggs as Ontario, namely allocation of quotas and the policing of the industry to make them conform to the quota system. Hog stabilization is a provincial program and is working well. All reports from Eastern Canada indicate a reduction in the number of dairy farmers. Land use legislation is in the offing in Nova Scotia and has been developed with the cooperation of the farmers organizations in the province.

Weather problems plague the grains in Alberta. Wheat acreage is down, barley and rape are up. Total acreage is about the same. Yields anticipated to be lower unless there is an excellent fall.

## Weather Outlook



The weather outlook in our area calls for warm days and cool nights according to the Simcoe Weather Bureau.
